ed on the upper side of a road will carry away the water which would otherwise seep into the roadbed, making it wet and soft.

Freezing loosens the soil, which is good in the field, but bad for the road and this condition also is benefitted by tile drainage.

Side ditches are important because they help to/remove ehe surface water and should lead into a water course or into a tile drain which carries the water away. Water should not be allowed to collect on low places by the roadside, as under places by the roadside, as under these conditions you never have a good road; it is always spongy, wet and full of ruts. The outside of the side ditch should be sloping enough so that freezing and thawing will not cause the earth to fall to the bottom and dam the ditch.

The surface of the road should be kept smooth and hard so that the water may easily flow to the sides to be carried away in the side ditches. 
