
CRACK NUT SUNDAY.

Prof. Robertson Defends Consolidated Schools

Prof. Robertson, principal of the Agricultural College at St. Anne de Belleviere, Quebec, founded by Sir William McDonald, addressed the Agricultural Committee of the Legislature upon "Consolidated Schools." He made a strong stand in favor of this kind of education. He certified to its usefulness, and deplored that little had been none in developing the Canadian children for the labor which many of them must take up at fourteen or fifteen years of age. Agricultural education, particularly for children, had been neglected. school garden had proved an admirable experiment wherever tried.

A very practical result had issued from the school garden. It taught the child many rudimentary things.
