It will be remembered that the Government guarantees seventy-five per cent. of the bonds covering "cost of construction" of the prairie and mountain sections to be constructed by the company. About \$16,000,000 of bonds have been issued, the Government paying the company as their expenditure is certified. Last year the company presented a claim for \$926,293. The accountant of the Railway Department went through the statement and struck out \$162,-000. These were accounts for legal outlays and general expenses which he would not recommend for payment as they were not "cost of construction."
