ONTARIO HOSPITALS. Annual Report of Dr. Smith, Inspector—Refers to Spread of Insanity and Our Psychopathic Needs.

The number of patients in hospitals, Oct. 1, 1906, was 2,549; admitted during the year, 37,573; discharged, 32,428; percentage of deaths 5.7; provincial grant to hospitals, \$110,000; from all sources, \$1,001,023.12; subscriptions, donations, etc., \$150,620.55; total expenditure, including carrying charges, \$874,037.12; average cost of patients, \$1.08; percentage of provincial grant to total maintenance expenditure, 12.34 cents.

Regarding houses of refuge, the report says: "Several houses the beds were found unclean and not free from vermin. In many the bathing facilities were quite inadequate, and the inmates left altogether too much to themselves to see that their persons were kept clean. All these conditions could be remedied if sufficient help was employed."

A QUEER OLD GUN. The Way the Ancient Matchlock Was Loaded and Fired. Among the arms now obsolete which formed a large part of the infantry equipment in the days when the army was started was the pike, which was in the form of a spear, with a flat pointed head, mounted on a staff from thirteen to eighteen feet long.

Between the pan and breech of the barrel communication was established by means of a small hole. When the piece was being loaded the grains of powder were naturally rammed and shaken down close to this hole, and when priming the soldier took care to perfect the communication of the powder in the pan with that in the barrel.
