May Allow Two Years to Qualify

Ontario Government Considering the Enforcement of the Decision Regarding Separate School Teachers.

(Toronto News)

The News understands that the Attorney-General, Hon. J. J. Foy, has under consideration the question as to whether the decision of the Education Department relative to the qualification of teachers in religious schools shall be subject to regulation by the Department or enactment by the Legislature. If decision is given for the latter course the legislation will be brought down at the present session of the House.

The necessity for the qualification of all teachers will, The News learns, be adhered to, as provided by the decision of the Privy Council in the case of the Christian Brothers. All teachers in separate schools or religious institutions receiving Government aid will be required, in future, to qualify according to the standard set by the Education Department.

It is believed, however, special concessions may be made to those unqualified teachers now engaged in the work. These concessions will be al-

THE WOOD LOT FROM A BUSINESS POINT OF VIEW

AN AGRICULTURAL JOURNAL PRESENTS THE VIEW THAT IT IS A PAYING PROPOSITION

Farmers' Advocate: Human inconsistency yields few stronger illustrations than the arguments with which some farmers defend their short-sightedness in destroying farm wood-lots. On the one hand, they join the universal clamor that high wages have made farming unprofitable. But, if you speak to them about the wisdom of preserving a part of their farm in wood, they will turn around and tell you that, by clearing the land, they can purchase all the fuel they want from the produce of two or three acres in grain. As if it cost nothing to produce that grain! Surely this argument shows curious lack of business reasoning.

Agriculture is not rendered unprofitable by high price of labor. In proof of this, reflect that, in spite of labor scarcity, farm land is advancing in value, and farmers were never so well off as they are now. By economy of labor, we may prevent this item from bulking more largely in the cost of production than it used to at half the rate per day. Nevertheless, labor is and always has been the greatest factor in the cost of crop production, and should, by rights, be valued equally, whether it is the proprietor's own labor or an employee's. Calculating on a business basis, it is safe to say that not very many farmers make from their holdings more than \$5.00 an acre per annum over and

tree without planting one in its place. There is wealth in store for the Canadian farmer who is enterprising enough to grow timber.

Let every man with the vestige of a bush fence it off and keep out stock. Even though it appears quite decayed, and doomed to extinction, a few years' protection from grazing will allow the seedlings to crowd out the grass. After that the old trees revive and make more vigorous growth. A striking case of this was told and illustrated in The Farmer's Advocate last winter, and many others have come under our observation. What nature has done, Nature can do. Give her a chance. First fence out your stock, and, as a further means of inducing neighbors to take up the good work, so important from a public as well as an individual standpoint, use your influence to have the township Council pass a by-law according to the Act put through at Toronto last winter, exempting from taxation unimproved woodland, to the extent of one acre for every ten in the farm. Do it now.

Note—To a large portion of the County of Victoria the above will not very much apply. The returns to the Bureau of Industries for 1905 show that there was only 46.5 per cent. of the land cleared, while those who have studied the subject give 25 per cent. of woodland as the proper area to retain, which would make 75 per cent. cleared. In the older portions, however, and in the adjoining county of Durham, there are portions where the forest has been removed below the necessary limit. The present is the time to consider the conservation of forest, which can be done in a portion of this county advantageously where the land is rough, in a way to produce a constant supply of timber for some years.

O.A.C. Students Taking up New Line of Work

The students of the Ontario Agricultural College have a Literary Society, which has, as part of its work, held an oratorical contest in each one of the last six years. This year an addition was made by providing for a speaking contest, in which those who took part were expected to deal with agricultural topics, and provision was made for the passing of judgment upon these contestants on the basis of the value their addresses would have had if delivered at a Farmers' Institute meeting. What was said by these candidates for Farmers' Institute honors contained evidence, says the Weekly Sun, that the students are taking up a new and most important branch of study. Heretofore, their energies have been devoted mainly to the means necessary to increase the production of the soil of Ontario. It is quite evident they are now looking, as well, into the causes which affect the manner in which the fruits of production are distributed. They are studying the influence of large combinations of capital in other lines than agriculture, the bearing which the transportation problem has on farmers' profits, and the effect of the tariff on farm conditions.

This is a most promising line of research, and might be extended still further with advantage to those who will be leaders in the agriculture of to-morrow. It is important, as The Sun has more than once said, to know how to produce the greatest quantity at the lowest cost; it is equally important to see that those who produce secure a fair share of the fruits of their toil.

In the Interests of Forestry

At the recent Forestry Convention held in Ottawa the resolutions passed were very numerous and wide in their scope, covering practically every phase of the forestry question. For the most part they consisted of requisitions to the Governments, Federal and Provincial alike, for the carrying out of reforms, and passing of certain legislation. The Government was requested to carry out the following measures: The placing of forest trees and seeds for afforestation on the free list; that in the issuing of crown patents of wooded lands precaution as to reservation be made; that more interest in tree planting be encouraged by instruction and the giving of facilities for obtaining necessary stock suitable for afforestation.

tion; that forests on the Rocky Mountain Watershed be protected; that exploration be commenced of the lands lying north of the Saskatchewan; that the fire ranging method be carried out and the force be enlarged to give protection against mining prospectors. The local Governments were requested to make provision for the reforestation of certain lands. The Federal and Provincial Governments, relieving the same from taxation, and the Railway companies, were taken to prevent fires from passing engines in view of the building of the new transcontinental lines.

Newton, salary, organist, \$500.00; Dr. Totten, salary, secretary, \$50.25; interest on mortgage, \$414.90; fuel, \$194.47; Light, Heat and Power Company, \$112.52; connexional funds, \$384.00; taxes for 1906, \$138.89; hospital, \$110.74; miscellaneous expenses, \$286.18; balance to 1907, \$2925.84; total, \$6047.75.

It is the intention of the Trustees to apply at least \$1500 of the cash on hand to reduce the mortgage debt of the church.

Navigation of Pigeon River

Omemee, March 16.—An enthusiastic meeting was held here last evening when speeches were delivered by several prominent citizens in reference to making Pigeon River navigable and part of the Trent Canal system. The Pigeon River runs from this village into Pigeon Lake. It was decided to send a big delegation to Ottawa on Tuesday next in connection with the Trent Canal deputation and ask that Pigeon River be cleared of weeds and other obstructions and made part of the Trent Canal system. The delegation will consist of leading business men, municipal and township representatives. The citizens of Omemee are intensely in earnest about the matter.
