

MR. ALLAN GILLIES RETURNING TO LINDSAY

WILL TAKE BUSINESS MANAGEMENT OF THE WATCHMAN-WARDER IN APRIL.

The Watchman-Warder has an interesting announcement to make formally this week—the securing of Mr. Allan Gillies, now business manager of the Stratford Herald, as business manager of The Watchman-Warder. The growing business of the Watchman-Warder, and the prospects for still further growth that seems to be in the immediate future, as well as some changes on the present staff have made it expedient to secure a man with a full and complete knowledge and a large and successful experience in newspaper business management to handle the increasing cares and have full control and grasp of the widening responsibilities. In Mr. Gillies, the Watchman-Warder feels that it has secured just the man for the place. In newspaper parlance we believe we have, in this instance, "made a scoop." Mr. Gillies will take charge of the business the first of April and the continued growth of the business seems assured. Mr. Gillies hardly seems to require any introduction to the people of this district, but if any such introduction is necessary, none better perhaps than the following from the Stratford Daily Herald of last Wednesday could be given. Mr. Gillies has been with the Herald for over six years and their estimation of him is consequently of force. The Herald says:—"An important change will take place at the end of March in The Herald's staff owing to the resignation of Mr. Allan Gillies, the secretary-treasurer of the company with the duties of business manager, who has accepted an improved position in his old home town at Lindsay. Hereafter the first of April he will give entire charge of the Lindsay Watchman-Warder, a prosperous weekly in that large and thriving town. "Mr. Gillies has been with The Herald since Feb. 10, 1902, having come to The Herald from Lindsay as Monday morning operator. The Herald chief has peculiar pleasure in noting the regular advancement which Mr. Gillies has made. His abilities as a printer, soon led to his promotion to the foremanship of the office, and later, when Mr. James Fisher resigned the business management to go to Toronto, to another promotion to follow that gentleman. Each successive promotion vindicated the wisdom of the selection, and now a further promotion comes, the next step in the succession, giving him control entirely of an important newspaper and plant. "The Watchman-Warder is the result of the consolidation of two papers following the usual result of the attempt to make three papers pay in a two-paper town. The Watchman-Warder was published by the late Mr. George Lytle and the Warder by Mr. Sam. Hughes, M.P., but in due course the two were amalgamated under the ownership of Mr. Lytle. Upon the latter's death a couple of years ago, the paper came into the hands of a company, and at the desire of that company Mr. Gillies will take charge of The Watchman-Warder. That he will succeed and that The Watchman-Warder will prosper all the more under his direction we have not the slightest doubt. "Mr. Gillies will be much missed on The Herald, to which paper he has rendered valuable and able service. As a business organizer he excels, and his mastery of the details of newspaper management and especially of the intricacies of the business of advertising, must have been very evident to newspaper men in attendance at their various gatherings, as well as to many Herald patrons. Mr. Gillies will leave The Herald to his native town under the circumstances of his creditable record out of it should go to commend him highly to the good wishes of his old friends in Lindsay, who no doubt will welcome such a manager of homecoming. The resignation of Mr. Gillies does not take effect until the end of March."
