Constable John Short Assaulted by Ruffians

Night Constable John Short was attacked and most brutally assaulted last night shortly after twelve o'clock, as a result of which he now lies in the Ross Memorial Hospital terribly bruised and gashed and suffering extreme pain.

Not long ago Constable Short arrested a nephew of Carlin's who was sentenced to a term in Kingston penitentiary, and this is said to have aroused the anger of Carlin with the result that he "had it in" for Constable Short.

CARLIN, OLD OFFENDER

Who is Carlin? The question has been asked and answered dozens of times to-day. It will be remembered that some twenty years ago that portion of the town known as the east ward was the abiding place of a gang of ruffians, who terrorized the citizens of Lindsay and especially the citizens living in the east ward. It was unsafe for a resident of the town to visit the east ward; men were assaulted and ladies were insulted, until human life became endangered. Highway robberies were made and houses were entered. Matters went from bad to worse and one "Mick" Carlin was recognized as the ringleader. His name was in every mouth and his dudgeon was to be feared.

John Campbell Had Hand Torn Off

A distressing and very painful accident occurred yesterday afternoon on the farm of Mr. Norman Campbell about two miles west of Lorneville, when his son, John Pearson Campbell, who is well known in Lindsay, lost one of his hands by getting it caught in the gearing of the last revolving windmill machinery.

The details of the accident were telephoned to The Watcher this morning by our own correspondent at Woodville, and it appears that Mr. Campbell, sr., was grinding feed with the windmill, when it got beyond control. The high wind made fans of the wind mill travel faster, and the faster the fans went around, the faster revolved the machinery. Mr. Campbell called to his son Johnny, for help, and they both endeavored to throw the machinery out of gear, but this they could not do. The car then attempted to stop the machinery by over-feeding it, and while doing this he unconsciously and unfortunately put his hand on the fast revolving shaft, and as he had a mit on, the mit was torn and before he could extricate his hand it was pulled into the cogs and twisted painfully around the shaft. The arm was almost instantly torn off below the elbow and a stream of blood flowed from the gaping, ugly wound, while the remainder of the limb was left in the machinery.

DESPITE THE PAINFUL NATURE OF THE wound, the young man walked to the house, leaving the hand in the machinery, and doctors were immediately summoned. Dr. Galloway and Dr. Grant of Woodville, soon arrived on the scene and they dressed the wound. The wounded young man is now resting fairly well, but is suffering a great deal of pain. The many friends of Mr. Campbell in Lindsay will regret to hear of the distressing accident. Mr. Campbell attended the Lindsay Collegiate Institute. He is a nephew of Mr. John Campbell, of Fairview Farm, near Woodville.

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
