Athletic Meet For Toronto Exhibition

It leaked out from C.A.A.U. headquarters to-day that the Exhibition authorities will put on a big amateur athletic day at the Exhibition this year. In fact, there may be two days—one amateur, the other of professional sports. The dates selected are Friday and Saturday, Sept. 1 and 2, and the scheme as outlined to the amateur athletics authorities by the Exhibition people indicates that visitors to the Fair will see the greatest set of amateur games ever held in Canada.—Star.

Gasoline Engines in Barns are Dangerous

If the mutual fire insurance companies throughout Ontario endorse the action taken by their delegates at the convention of the Mutual Fire Underwriters' Association, held in Toronto there will in future be an additional charge levied against users of the gasoline engine who keep the machine and accompanying tank within insured buildings. A committee was set aside to thoroughly go into the matter. This committee reported to the meeting. For such farmers as keep their engine within their barns they provide a special permit, issued at a cost of 50 cents, and an additional charge on the insurance carried of 60 cents per thousand dollars per annum.

Against this the report recommends that if a farmer keeps the engine not less than twenty feet away from the insured building, and the tank containing the gasoline twenty-five feet away, no additional charge will be made. The stationary engine must be such as pumps the gasoline from the tank. The tank must be of not less than one and one-half barrel capacity, and must be made from galvanized iron, sixteen to eighteen gauge in thickness, and must be placed at a lower level than the engine, if possible underground. This immunity is allowed only on the guarantee that no artificial light shall be allowed near the tank, and that no gasoline be stored in the insured building.

Fire in the Gier block at Macleod, Alberta, did \$10,000 damage. The American hotel at Moncton, N.B., was damaged to the extent of \$20,000, and a blaze in Naylor's factory and the Standard Glove works at St. Johns, Quebec, threatened the destruction of the town.

Opposition to Taft Measures. Washington, March 2.—After a two hours' conference with President Taft yesterday, leaders of Congress announced that they would oppose amendments to the several admiralty jurisdiction bills when it became apparent that the amendments were offered in a spirit hostile to the main purpose of the proposed legislation.

Six Hurt in New York Fire. New York, March 2.—Six persons were injured, two of them, firemen, seriously, in a fire which yesterday afternoon destroyed a five-story building at 244 West 65th street, occupied by automobile concerns.

Several automobiles were destroyed and the total loss is estimated at \$50,000.

Weird Plot of Five Boys. Greenwich, Conn., March 2.—Five boys of foreign parentage, the oldest only 19 and the youngest 10, confessed yesterday, after arrest here, a plan to wreck a fast New Haven passenger train, which leaves New York shortly after noon, and plunder the bodies of the dead.

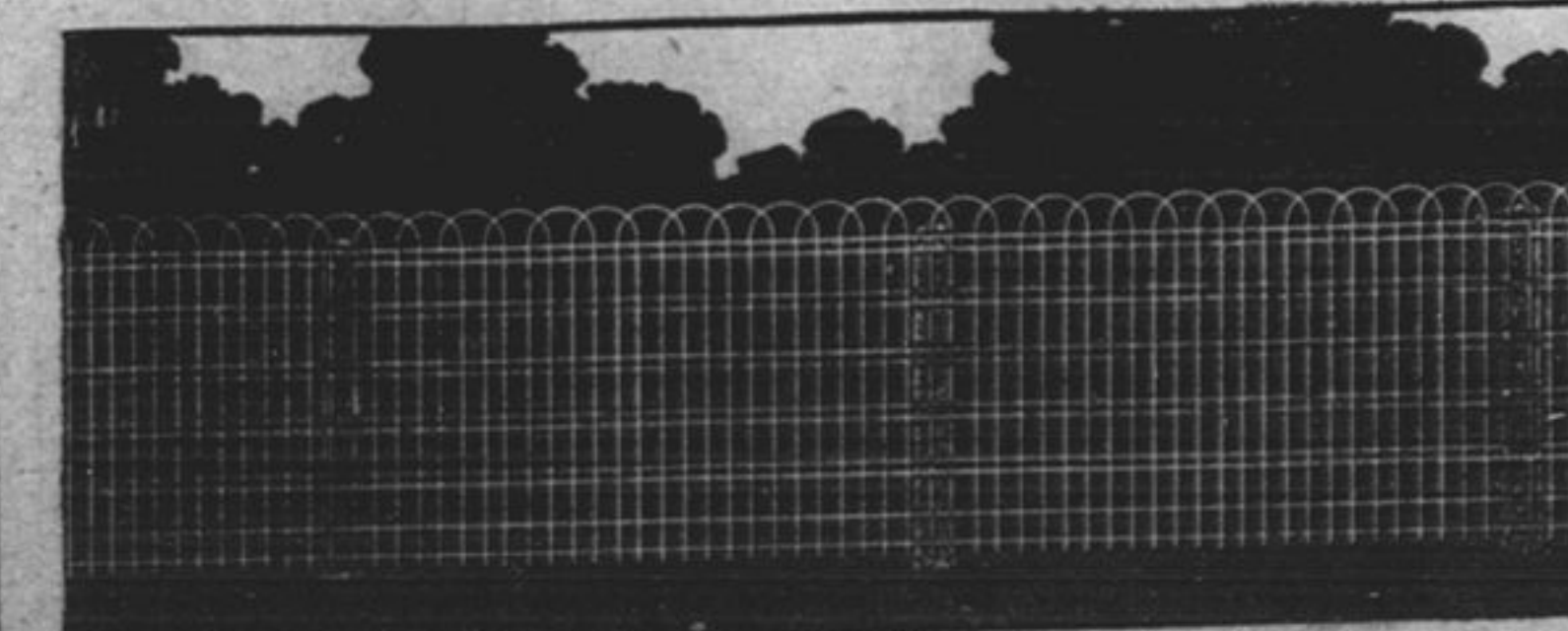
