Weather For March According to

A regular storm period is on the 1st, beginning in the evening and ending March 3rd. This is at the centre of Earth and becoming greatly intensified, torial storms of great energy, blowing from the north to the south, should be expected. About the 2nd and 3rd, close of this and other March, look for blizzards with high northerly gales with sweeping from the north into the south and east.

A reactionary storm period on the 6th, 7th and 8th, with storms that unsettled, if not weather may fill much of the period of the month. The disturbance, combined with and Mars, are sufficient heavy and prolonged disturbance any time throughout the Watch especially at each of the storm periods.

A regular storm period from the 10th to the 15th, central day of this period, the moon is on the celestial equator and in perigee.
