Mariposa Council Proceedings

The members were all present. The following communications were read: From Mr. Albert Scott notifying the council that Mr. William Glass had placed a lot of timber on the road allowance at lot 22, con. 2, and desires to have it removed, as it is dangerous for public travel.
 From the Watchman-Warder expressing regret at being able to publish only a portion of the council proceedings for February on account of the crowded condition of their pages. From Mr. Theo. Stewart, Township Solicitor, respecting a by-law prior to the incorporation of the Mariposa Northern Telephone Co. Mr. Stewart stated that the present time in the Ontario Legislature with regard to the present time in the rural telephone, and he thought it would be prudent to let the matter stand for a little. The Canadian Road Machine Co. of Hamilton, advise the council that they have sold their business to the American Road Machine Co. of Goderich. The persons interested in the Hall municipal drain No. 1 were notified that the engineers' report would be read at 10 a.m., as provided by statute, but only some three or four came, but only some three or four came, but only some three or four came.
 On motion of Messrs. Rogers and Ferguson, the clerk was authorized to notify Mr. Glass to remove the timber from off the road allowance.
 On motion of Messrs. Swain and Rogers Messrs. Mitchell, Vance and Ferguson were appointed a committee to investigate the matter of putting a bridge across the bay at con. 1, 10, 3 and 4.
 On motion of Messrs. Swain and Ferguson, the clerk was authorized to place notices and also to advertise that the council of Mariposa intend at a meeting to be held on Monday, the 18th of April, to pass a by-law closing up that part of the road between lots 5 and 6 in concession 'A' of the township of Mariposa. The by-law provides for the sale of the lands, and any person whose lands shall be prejudicially affected by the stopping up or the closing of the road may be heard in person or by the council.
 On motion of Messrs. Swain and Ferguson, the report of Mr. A. G. Cavana, O.L.S., of the Township of Mariposa was adopted, and the clerk was authorized to prepare a by-law to provide for borrowing on the credit of the municipality for said work, and for issuing the debentures of the municipality for the requisite amount, and payable within twenty years from date with interest at a rate of not less than 4 1/2 per cent., and that a copy of the said by-law including notice of the Court of Revision, and the notice as to proceedings to quash be served upon each of the assessed owners or their lessors as provided by sections 19 to 22 of the Municipal Drainage Act of 1897.
 On motion of Messrs. Rogers and Ferguson the following changes were made in the list of Overseers for 1910: Beat 2, Howard Wellington; Beat 12, John Brown; beat 22, G. W. Hardy; beat 24, Nelson Weldon; beat 36, John McDonald; beat 45, James Thorburn; beat 38, Bentley Faithful; beat 33, West, Amos Rogers; beat 56, William Clark; beat 58, Edwin Wickett; beat 75, John Short; beat 76 west, Fred Starr; beat 4, at Manilla, Ernest Harrison; beat 3, northern boundary, Neil McTaggart. That beat 2 centre, be united with beat 2. That Joseph Pogue be poundkeeper at lot 18, con. 'B', and Angus Campbell at Manilla. Accounts aggregating some \$55.00 were ordered to be paid, after which the council adjourned to meet on the 18th of April.
