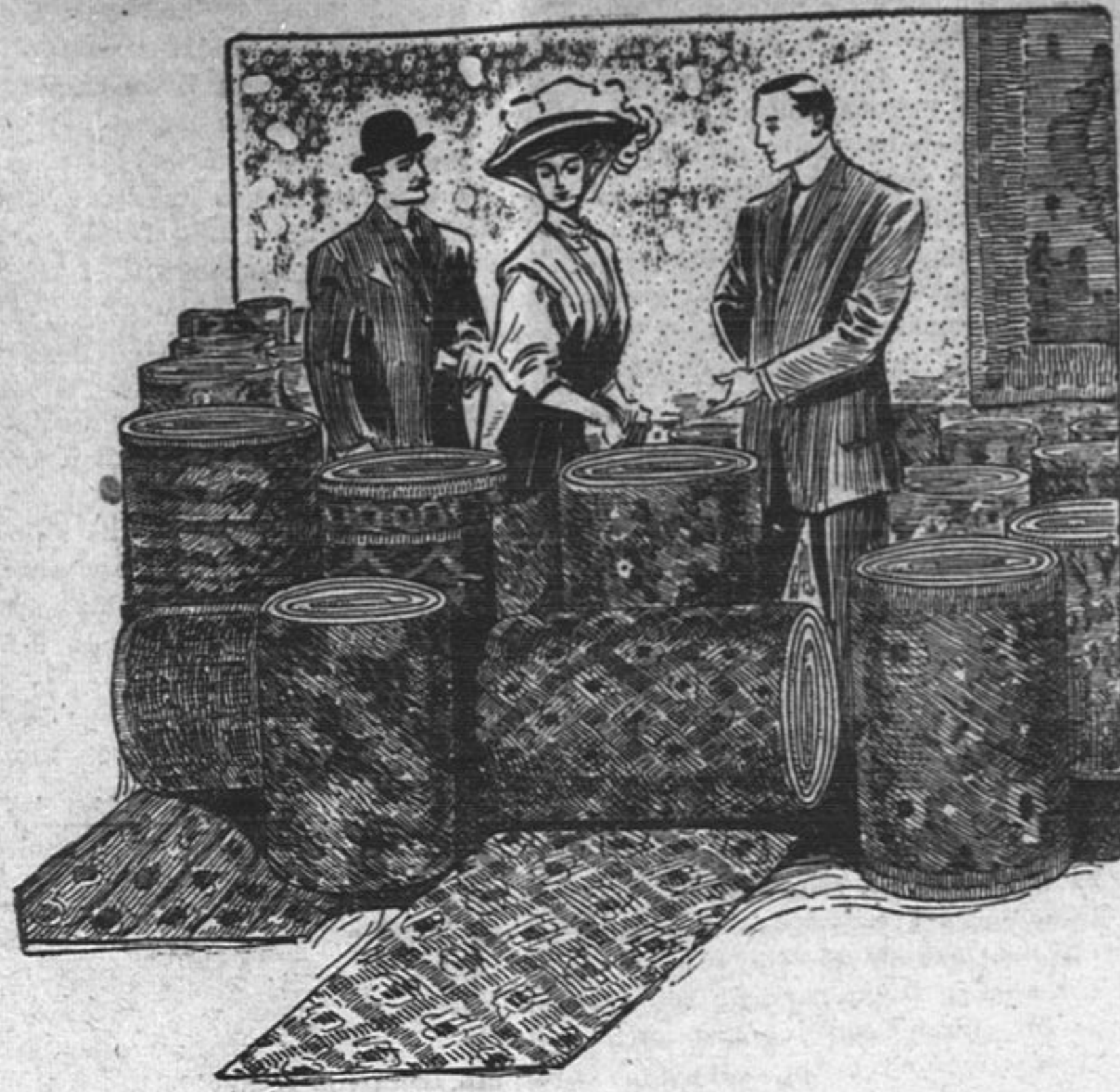
MR. J. NESBITT.
