the farm, a recognition of the dignity of the work in which they are engaged, and the return which may be secured from it. Why should not a young woman who has had the advantage of high school and college training, go back to the farm and ask her father to give her suitable buildings in which to raise poultry, or why should she not offer to superintend the work of an improved dairy, and the production of milk and cream? Why should not the farmer's son, who has had the advantage of a high school training, or for that matter a college course, be encouraged to seek to improve the character of the stock upon the farm, and inasmuch as reward for effort stimulates further effort, why should not, both in the case of the son and daughter, the farmer learn to give them a portion of the profits secured by reason of their labor? If there were sound organization upon every farm in this province, the use of better seed, the growth of better fruit, the improvement in the character of stock, the enlarged possibilities of yield through better under-draining, the returns which are possible in the aggregate, would stagger the imagination of the members of this Club.

NO USE IN SCOLDING.

Agitation and scolding against packers and middlemen should cease, and in substitution a worthier activity be established. I hope I shall be guilty of no violation of a canon of good taste if I say a personal word on this point. I have been identified with a business which for twenty years has handled from 60 to 80 per cent. of the live hogs which have been slaughtered in the packinghouses in Ontario, and a business which peculiarly has been a subject of the agitation to which I have referred. The officers of the company have during these years sought for profit and advantage only through the exercise of intelligence in the administration of the business. They have sought to know the business thoroughly. They have recommended liberal expenditure upon plant and equipment. They have endeavored to convert waste material into by-products. As a result of these efforts, they have secured profitable returns for the shareholders. At no time during these years have they had, or has it been suggested that they should have, a share in any combination or agreement or undertaking, whereby the prices at which animals should be bought or product should be sold, should be affected. We have always played a lone hand. In our operations we have chosen as a matter of policy two dominant considerations—to secure no advantage through combination and to injure no small dealer by the arbitrary exercise of power.

MASTERY OF BUSINESS.

If criticism should be passed upon success following unsparring effort to master the business in which we were engaged, and operated under unrestricted and untrammelled competition where the only advantage sought was in the returns which the exercise of our sense and capacity would give, then criticism should be passed. For my part I refuse to limit the capacity of the men with whom I am associated to that of the critics, whether they are cabinet ministers, journalists, or farmers, and I will make no apology for the profit which may be secured from business operated under such conditions. If in a moderate degree Ministers of Agriculture representing the Governments at Ottawa, or at Toronto, if in a moderate degree farmers who were breeders or feeders, had brought to bear upon their problems the same spirit of intelligent effort which the officers of the company with which I am identified have brought to bear upon their problems during the last twenty years, a different story would have to be told, from the one revealed in the official records of the production and yields from the farms in this and other provinces.

WASTE INTO MONEY.

I hold no brief for, and have no relation with packers in the States. I know they are a body of unpopular men who are roundly condemned. I know nothing as to whether they are combined in their efforts or otherwise. This I do know, however, that whatever may be their faults, they have been, and are, the greatest single factor in the development and possible enlargement of the live stock industry in the United States. I would venture the statement that probably the entire profit which they have made during the past year out of their colossal enterprises, is represented in returns secured from materials which 20 years ago were absolute waste.

The plain fact is that the whole trend of modern industrial conditions is to secure profit through a very small percentage of advance upon a great volume of trade, and to convert what has been waste matter into merchantable material. In these respects the body of middlemen over this continent have shown rare capacity, and however large, their profits may be in the aggregate, they represent a percentage of advance upon the business done, smaller than has hitherto been known in the world's enterprises. The Swift Company has recently published that their turnover for the year 1909 was \$250,000,000. When you reflect that 1 per cent. upon this huge business means \$2,500,000 or 3 per cent. \$7,500,000, you will understand what part volume plays in securing profit. Consider what an increase in price 1 per cent. or 3 per cent. upon the price of a pound of butter, a pound of meat, or a dozen of eggs, means to the consumer. As a result of such consideration you will share with me perhaps in wonder that so little effort has been made to understand the simple facts which at once refute many foolish, unfair and immoderate statements.

CHEAPER KINDS OF FOOD.

On the side of consumers, a remedy but little prescribed, and more rarely taken, is to be found in the better training of our girls and women to know how to prepare appetizing dishes from cheaper kinds of food. There are rougher cuts of meat which can practically be purchased to-day at the same price as when cattle were dollars per hundred cheaper, and which hang as a drug in the butcher shops in this town and in every town and city in this province because the women in the homes have not been taught and trained how to make use of these cheaper cuts so as to give food satisfactory to the palate of work-people, and others whose wages are insufficient to meet the increased cost of choicer cuts. There is waste in buying, in preparing, and in the ultimate use of food, which calls for the women in our homes to learn the lesson of better judgment in buying, better administration in the home, and better knowledge how to cook and prepare foods.
