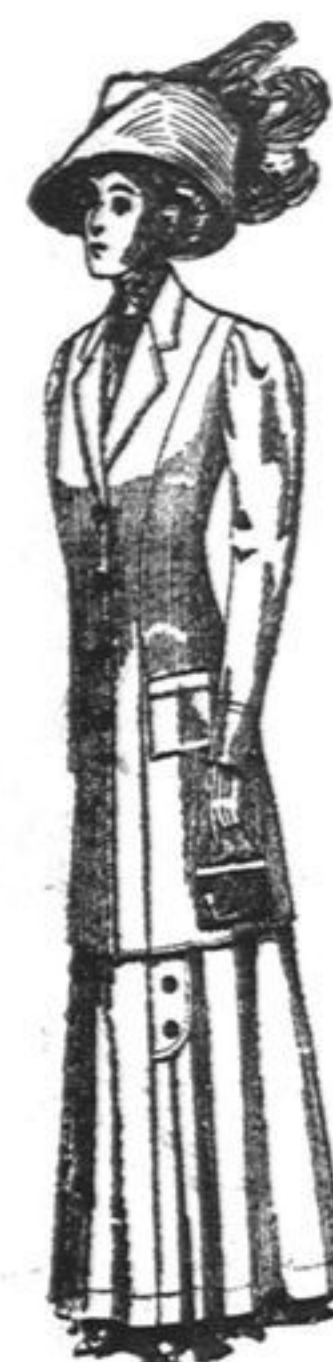

Ex-Lindsay Citizen Becomes Principal of New College

An announcement of great interest to the Anglican Church in Canada was made yesterday, says a Toronto dispatch, when arrangements were completed for the establishment of a new evangelical college in Vancouver, B.C. With the news of the launching of the new educational institution, to be known as Latimer College, to serve the Church in British Columbia, came the resignation of Rev. W. H. Vance, B.A., the rector of the Church of the Ascension on Richmond-st., who is leaving Toronto to become principal. While the leaders in the church in that diocese would like to retain the services of Rev. Mr. Vance, they see sure and great opportunities for development, and a large field of activity and usefulness in British Columbia, and the congregation have accepted his resignation, to take effect on June 1. Through association with Wycliffe College, the work of the alumni, the Deaconess Training House, and the difficulties which meet the rector of a downtown church such as the Church of the Ascension, Toronto, the new principal has had experience which well fits him for his new post. Rev. Mr. Vance, although but 34 years of age, has been invariably successful in all his undertakings, and his friends see in his new appointment a still further opportunity for advancement. Rev. Mr. Vance is well known in Lindsay, having attended the Collegiate Institute. He also married a popular young Lindsay lady, a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Geo. Beall, Albert-st.
