THOSE FUNDS THEN SUICIDED: Buffalo, N. Y., Feb. 24—Just after being taken into custody charged with the embezzlement of \$1,000 from the Welland Vale Co., of St. Catharines, for whom for many years the accused was the trusted employee. O. A. Allen, aged fifty, took morphine and chloral and died in the emergency hospital last night.

PROTESTANTS UP IN ARMS: Montreal, Feb. 24—A fierce arraignment of the Roman Catholic Church and of nationalism in Quebec was made at a meeting of French protestants here last night. After a series of vigorous speeches a resolution was passed saying that the time had come when extraordinary privileges should be withdrawn from the Roman Catholics of Quebec, and the Church placed on the same footing as other denominations.

DRAGGED BY TEAM: Mr. Harry Elsom, of the 7th line of Cavan, was the victim of a serious accident last night, which might have proved fatal. Mr. Elsom, who has only one hand, uses a hook in the place of the missing member, the hook in question being the cause of the accident. Mr. Elsom had returned from Millbrook and was in the act of unhitching the horses when one of them bolted, dragging Mr. Elsom, who was caught in the harness, by the hook.

They dragged the unfortunate victim around the yard several times, until finally the hook broke, releasing Mr. Elsom from his perilous position, but not until he had sustained a broken leg and several other injuries. Drs. Turner and Wright were immediately summoned, and were unable to ascertain up to a late hour last night the extent of the injuries.—Peterboro Examiner.

NEW GOLD FIELD

Sault Ste Marie, Ont., Feb. 22—Mr. J. J. Byrne, who has been interested in the gold and silver discoveries at Cobalt, Porcupine and Gowganda, returned to the "So" this afternoon, from Hobson, a new gold field discovered by William Moquist of the "So" last November. Byrne with J. Hollinger, who with his brother Ben, staked the Timmins claim at Porcupine, which was sold for \$330,000, have staked 16 claims at Hobson adjoining the Moquist claims, and all show rich values. Byrne says the formation at Hobson is similar to that at Porcupine, and that values are equally as good. The fields are only 166 miles apart. The new field is easy of access, the C.P.R. running within 11 miles of the most important claims and the N. C.R. when forming a junction with the C.P.R., at Hobson, will run directly through one of the richest gold fields on the continent. Assays made on Hobson ore run from \$6.00 to \$400.00 a ton. It is expected that with the advent of spring a rush will be made to Hobson, the finds having created considerable excitement among the mining men of the north.

Butter Making

Manilla, Feb. 27—The Manila branch of the W. I. met at the home of Mrs. Sam Clark, on the afternoon of Wednesday, Feb. 22nd. An excellent and helpful paper was given by Miss Jennie Glendenning, graduate of Guelph College on "Butter making on the farm." This paper in part was as follows: Civilization advances our tastes become more acute and demand finer foods. This is exceptionally true in regard to butter. When we consider that over one-half of the butter produced in Ontario is made on the farm, should we not take pride in giving to the people a number one quality, and so doing procure the best market price? Bad butter invariably shows a lack of skill or care. A uniform good butter is made only by having proper utensils and an intelligent idea of the principles which make dairying a scientific art. To make dairying profitable only the best cows should be kept. You can judge what a cow is doing only by occasionally weighing her milk. Keep your cows in a well lighted, well ventilated and comfortable stable and give them plenty of pure water and a balanced food ration. This, with kind treatment should bring good returns. As soon as milk is drawn from the cow it should be taken from the stables and strained through a fine brass strainer. The separator is the most satisfactory method of getting cream from milk. Before putting up a new separator we should select a clean, well ventilated place where a pure atmosphere can at all times be assured. The separator should have a solid foundation. It should be fastened with bolts to the floor. Have the milk at normal temperature, and turn the machine at regular speed. In the collection cream for churning the cream should be kept in ice water in summer, and in winter should be kept in a room with a temperature of 60 degrees. Keep the can covered and atmosphere and surroundings sweet and clean. When beginning to collect cream for fresh cream or culture of good clean flavor. This culture may consist of a pint or two of soft cream from your previous churning. The reason for adding the culture is the bacteria, which produces a fine flavored butter may take possession of the new cream before other germs which may prove to be objectionable, gain control. To prevent loss of butter fat in buttermilk, sweet cream should not be added during the last twenty-four hours before churning. Separator cream should be cooled because if left the lactic acid will very soon develop and cream will become curdled in appearance. The foam should be well stirred, as it will not absorb butter color and will therefore cause white specks in the butter. When cream has a smooth glossy appearance, pours like molasses, and has pleasant acid taste, it is fit for churning. No definite temperature for churning can be given, but necessity for constant use of the thermometer must be emphasized.

There are many conditions which influence temperature for churning as follows: 1. Quality of cream. 2. Quantity of cream.
