LINDSAY ONTARIO Address and Presentation In Ops

Salem, Ops, March 15.—On Tuesday evening a large number of the friends of Mr. and Mrs. Jno. H. Peel and family gathered at their home to spend an evening with them before their departure from the neighborhood, their son taking charge of the farm.

It was a complete surprise to Mr. and Mrs. Peel, but they welcomed some eighty of their friends in their usual cordial manner. An impromptu program was supplied, consisting of instrumental music, solos, choruses and recitations.

Mr. John Devitt also occupied the chair. There were also several short speeches by neighbors and friends, who spoke in the highest terms of Mr. and Mrs. Peel. They were presented with a set of dishes and a clock as slight tokens of the high esteem in which they are held by their friends and neighbors.

Mr. Peel made a suitable reply, in which he thanked them for their beautiful gifts and words. Refreshments were served, and all returned to their homes feeling that they had spent a most delightful evening, and would not soon forget March 14th. Some weeks ago the council asked for tenders for the purchase of the \$55,000 of bonds authorized to provide for the new Public schools. These bonds were bearing 4 per cent interest, and, as the highest tender, that of the Dominion Bond Company was only \$50,908, leaving a serious shortage to meet the building contracts, it was decided to apply to the Ontario Railway and Municipal Board to change the rate to 4 1/2 per cent, and also to make the bonds straight term instead of installment. This change would call for the establishment of a sinking fund to meet the bonds at maturity and the town clerk was instructed to invite tenders from financial institutions for the placing of the sinking fund. At last night's meeting of the finance committee it was decided to accept the proposition of the Victoria Loan & Savings Company, offering the town 4 1/2 per cent interest on the sinking fund for a period of 30 years.

Sale of Public School Bonds

The Duke of Connaught may go to India as Viceroy after a short stay in Canada. A Montreal man served with legal notices in French, which he could not read, ignored them, and judgment was given against him by default. He applied for redress, but was refused.

C. P. R. Starts Work at Reaboro

Reaboro, March 13.—The basket soiled held under the auspices of the Reaboro hockey club was a success. There were a large number of baskets, all of which sold at good prices. The highest price paid was two dollars and thirty cents. Mr. Tom Skuce was auctioneer. Supper was served to those who had not baskets, at twenty-five cents each. There was a good program. A number of people attended from Omemee, some of whom took part in the program. Reeve Hawkins was chairman for the occasion. The proceeds amounted to forty-two dollars, which will be used to buy suits and other necessities for the team.
