OBITUARY.

HENRY GLADMAN

The death of Mr. Henry Gladman, which occurred at Toronto on March 5, came as a shock to friends of deceased in Lindsay. It was known that the deceased gentleman was in failing health, but the sudden end was not expected. The late Mr. Gladman had been postmaster in Lindsay for a number of years and was highly respected by all who knew him.

Mr. Gladman was born at Moose Factory in 1834, a son of George Gladman, chief factor of the Hudson Bay Company. He spent his younger days with the Hudson Bay Company, and was with his father on the Dawson-Blind expedition from Lake Superior to Fort Garry. When his father retired from the Hudson Bay Company, the family moved to Port Hope.

Mr. Gladman was appointed Postmaster at Lindsay in 1875, and a short time ago went to Toronto to live. He is survived by his wife, who was Miss Melissa Reinford, and when he married in 1864. Six sons also survive: Dr. George J., of New York; Mr. Henry, of Youngstown, O.; Dr. E. A., of Fulton, N.Y.; C. R. A., of 58 Farnham-ave., Toronto; Mr. C. L. Gladman, L.L.B., and V. L. Gladman, B.Sc., of 3 Nimitz-ave., Toronto.

The funeral arrangements have not yet been made.

So far the lady has not been able to find the key that unlocks the good nature and generosity of her husband and so she seeks advice from other women who have been up against the same sort of proposition.

Of course, one would like to say that the best way to treat a contrary man is to bat him over the head with a coffee pot, but, unfortunately, women lack the physical strength to enforce such an argument against contrariness. Besides which our effete civilization discourages such wholesome means of family discipline.

All that is left then, for the woman who is married to a man with a mulish disposition is to treat him as she would any other donkey who hasn't sense enough to do what is right and proper, because it is right and proper, but who has to be tolled and cajoled along the way he should go.

The discouraging thing about contrariness is that it is visible and outward sign of lack of brains, and that is an incurable malady. A man or woman of intelligence can always be cured of a fault. He or she may be enlightened, broadened, raised up to higher levels, but a fool is hopeless.

Several teamsters have reason to remember the strong arm of the law invoked by her at the spectacle of some inhuman brute beating an emaciated horse, staggering under an abnormal load. The following beautiful appeal, issued by the New York police Department, through Miss Buckingham's influence, is being widely circulated, and has been of incalculable benefit to the horse:
