Coal to the amount of 263,774,312 tons was produced in 1909, the value at the pit mouth being \$351,374,500.

There are eighteen of these in England and Wales, six in Scotland, and six in Ireland.

The South Wales coal field is the chief source of anthracite coal for the British navy and mercantile marine.

The coal fields of Staffordshire, Warwickshire and the north of England are the seat of the great manufacturing and engineering industries.

From South Wales, Northumberland and Fife shire coal is exported in vast quantities.

Cobourg, March 5.—Owing to dissatisfaction on the part of the attorney-general's department at Toronto over the conduct of the trial of Henry Hicks of Cobourg, charged with perjury in connection with the Brimacombe murder trial a year ago, an order was issued for the re-opening of the Hicks case, and a new grand jury was empanelled.

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EATEN BY WOLVES.

Fort William, March 5.—A searching party which left Sand Point, on the north shore of Lake Nepigon, during last week on the report of a mail carrier being missing, found traces of a tragedy on the North trail along the line of the Canadian Pacific survey and construction camps. Eight miles out a piece of one hand and a shin were found in scumpled snow to the left of the track, these being the only human remains found to tell of the grim fate of the man. Two letters and a brass lock picked up were the only remnants of his majesty's mails.
