OBITUARY

LATE THOS. BEALL

The death on Friday, March 1st, 1912, of Mr. Thos. Beall, marks the passing of another of Lindsay's old citizens. Mr. Beall was a native of Cornwall, England, and recollected distinctly the coronation celebrations of the late Queen Victoria. His family came to this country in 1859, his father taking up land in the Township of East Whithy, not far from the town of Oshawa, and of all the family, eleven in number, all have predeceased him except one brother. Mr. Beall was in business for many years in the Town of Whithy, removing in 1860 to the village of Oakwood, and thence to Lindsay in 1868, the year following the great fire, and established the jewelry business which has since been carried on continuously by son and grandson.

For many years Mr. Beall gave much attention to tree and fruit growing and to the late Mr. John Knowlson and himself are largely due the honor of first proving by actual results that pears and grapes, as well as the better varieties of apples, could be grown here, at that time practically everything in the way of fruit being imported, and in 1870 he won the medal for display of grapes at the Dominion exhibition.

Mr. Beall was for many years Secretary of the Victoria Agricultural Society and the present favorable standing of the Ontario Horticultural Society is largely due to the initial work he did in the organization of subsidiary societies all over this province. To him the credit is due for the supervision and arrangement of the trees and shrubs at the Riverside cemetery.

He was a member of the Masonic Order, a member of the town council, a loyal though unaggressive supporter of Conservatism and British connection in Canada. He was a member of St. Paul's church and always a staunch believer in the tenets of the Church of England.

Two years ago Mr. and Mrs. Beall celebrated the sixtieth anniversary of their wedding. He is survived by his widow, his son, two grandsons, four granddaughters and three great grandchildren.

The funeral of the late Mr. Beall was held Sunday, when the following gentlemen acted as pall bearers: Messrs. Wm. Needler, J. H. Southerton, W. M. Robson, C. A. Cooper, and two grandsons. Rev. Canon Marsh officiated.

J. CAVANAGH

Another aged resident of Victoria Road was called to receive his eternal reward in the person of Mr. W. R. Cavanagh, on Saturday, March 2. The deceased had been an inmate of the House of Refuge at which place he had been since Dec. 19 of last year. The old man was 71 years of age and had been a sufferer from heart trouble. The deceased was once a prosperous retail merchant in Victoria, Road and had sufficient money to pay for his keep at the House of Refuge. He is survived by two brothers, residents of Orillia. The burial will take place in Victoria Road.

JAS. WHITE

On Wednesday the 28th Feb. ult., James White, an aged inmate of the house of refuge, passed to the great beyond. The deceased had been in the institution for about six years and was a sufferer from a mild form of brain storm, but paralysis was the immediate cause of death. The deceased was 85 years of age, a Methodist in religion. The remains were interred in the Bobcaygeon cemetery.

FREDERICK EGGERS SCHATZ

After a somewhat lingering illness there passed away in the Ross Memorial Hospital on Saturday last, Frederick Eggers Schatz, aged 19 years, 8 months and 4 days. The deceased young man has been residing in and around Lindsay for the past two years and was known to a large number of Lindsay people. He was the son of Mr. John P. Schatz, of Bellevue, Pa., and for some time resided with his sister, Mrs. Arthur R. Webster, Oakwood, from whose place the funeral was held on Tuesday. Recently the young man was employed in the north as a timber scaler, and for a time was employed at Mr. C. B. Naylor's Barber shop.
