TRAINING CADETS TO LESSEN CRIME. Hon. Col. Hughes Views on Benefits of Military Training. Ottawa, March 17.—Col. the Hon. Sam Hughes has issued for general circulation two memoranda designed to explain the lines upon which he is working. One deals with cadet corps training, and is signed by the Minister himself. It is addressed to the general public, and contains the following paragraph: "To govern and control humanity, negatively, or by restraint, requires a vast army of policemen, constables, magistrates, judges, jurymen and lawyers besides expensive jails, prisons, court-houses and penitentiaries, costing in the aggregate many times more than do all the Canadian militia, with drill-halls, armouries, fortifications and warlike material included."

The other memorandum gives figures comparing the cost of "positive training," in which he classes military training, with "negative training," which leads in criminality, the Minister's argument being that the instruction of boys as cadets lessons the likelihood of their entering idle, criminal and wasting classes. In 1909, he says, the general administration of justice cost \$32,200,000 in Canada, or \$4.57 a head, while in 1912-13 it will cost \$1.15 a head for military training and preparation. He also observes that far more is spent in taxes on liquor and tobacco than in the militia, and by a series of calculations, places the total yearly cost of the "negative army" at \$197,000,000, or \$18.20 a head, as against \$1.15 a head for the militia.
