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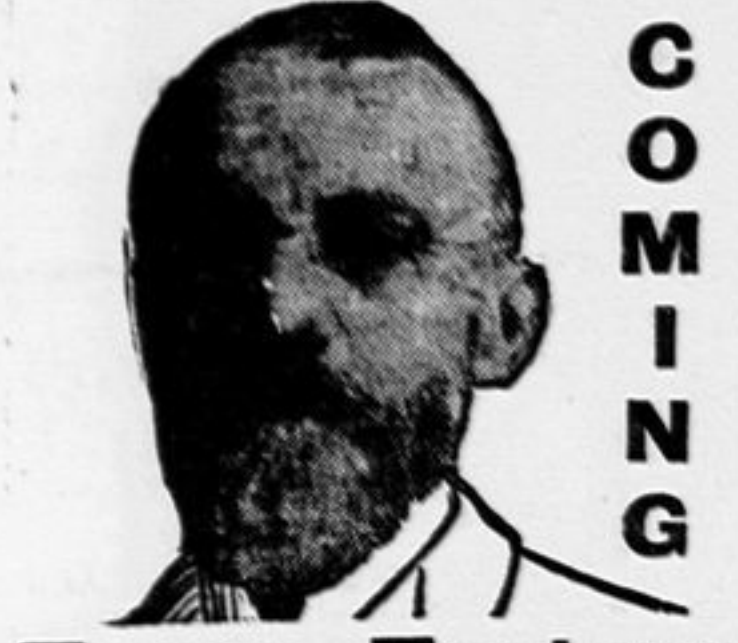

MILLINERY OPENING

FINE DISPLAY AT MISS MITCHELL'S PARLORS.

The early millinery openings of the season at Miss Mitchell's parlors, over Campbell's grocery, started last Thursday. The room was tastefully decorated with the new spring flowers and other decorations; the large display being exceptionally grand. The large show room was well attended with citizens, including several other milliners, and the remarks passed between them promise a successful season.

Among the beautiful models that merited particular attention was a large sterling shape made of cream mohair braid, trimmed with two large imitation willow plumes; the plumes standing up straight on right side and falling gracefully over the crown. It also has a wreath of light, tan satin roses all round the crown and coming up high at right side.

Another attractive shape was to be had in a turban shape of cream mohair braid, the braid being loosely draped around the brim, while the crown is covered with deep cream silk roses and a large bow of mohair braid at side, back, standing straight.

A beautiful effect was to be seen in large black picture hat trimmed with numerous plumes, with with streamers of black satin ribbon and silk lace with large loops here and there on streamers; the hat amounting to \$105.
