**How Obstruction Costs the Country**

"If Canada doesn't watch out, out at \$10,000 a day this means she'll spend the price of a Dreadnought deciding upon a policy," remarked a white haired Senator as he emerged from the Speaker's gallery of the Commons the other morning, where he had listened for almost an hour to Mr. E. B. Devlin, of Wright, denouncing the Government's proposal, says the Ottawa Journal. Mr. Devlin spoke in French.

A random shot, it was nevertheless nearer the mark than perhaps the veteran parliamentarian suspected. It is costing Canada a whole lot of money in trying to decide upon a naval policy, and it looks as if it is going to cost a whole lot more.

**COST OF ONE DAY.**  
 Just how much this naval word engagement has removed from the treasury it is quite impossible to give in exact figures, but a fairly accurate estimate is not difficult to arrive at. Mathematicians have never quite agreed as to the actual cost of the country of a day's session of Parliament. Most agree, however, that \$10,000 is a conservative estimate.

With this basis—the cost of \$10,000 a day for the session—to work upon, it is easy to reach closely the actual amount which Canadians are being taxed for naval oratory.

**DEBATED FOR 30 DAYS.**  
 The debate has been going on for something like 38 days. Figured

that thus far, about three hundred thousand dollars have been swallowed up, or else wasted in hot air in the Commons chamber.

That much abused individual, the "man in the street," must be appalled to learn that an hour's speech—a very brief and modest performance for the average naval debater—costs the country the tidy sum of \$1,200. If the member is particularly verbose and talks two hours, it costs \$2,400, which is equal to his indemnity. Members of Parliament are expensive beings for the State. Ten one-hour speeches in a session cost \$12,000, and ten one-hour speeches in a session by a single member is not a very unusual performance. The figures given below are reached after a study of the facts.

**SHORT STORY OF A FAMILIAR HYMN**  
 (By Max McD., in Winnipeg Free Press.)

**RESCUING THE PERISHING.**

Few hymns, ancient or modern, have been more useful or more variably used than "Rescue the Perishing," by Fanny J. Crosby, the blind poet and hymn-writer.

It was through a beautiful incident in the Bowers Mission, New York City, that this hymn was written. A young man was brought to God one night through Miss Crosby's persistent entreaty. The circumstances so impressed themselves upon Miss Crosby's mind that she could think of nothing else, and going home, she threw off her wraps and did not retire until she had written "Rescue the Perishing."

Two years later, while addressing a meeting of the Y.M.C.A. at Lynn, Mass., Miss Crosby told the story of the hymn. Afterwards, when shaking hands with the audience a young man came up and said: "I am the boy you prayed for that night. I found the Saviour and gave myself to Him, and since that time I have been trying to live a consistent Christian life."

In the same mission in New York, an old soldier leading a service was the means of bringing the captain of his old old regiment back to God. "Rescue the Perishing" was the hymn that touched his heart.

The lines:  
 "Touched by a loving heart, weakened by kindness,  
 Chords that were broken will vibrate once more,"  
 so touched the heart of a man in Sussex, England, as to make it vibrate with His praises ever since.

A Canadian missionary in the oil fields of Alberta tells of a whole camp of workers touched by the singing of this so that from gambling and rough talking, the men changed to praising God nightly as they sat around the fire in the bunk-house.

Although totally blind, Miss Crosby was an active worker in rescue missions for a quarter of a century.

**THE ONLY WAY**

The crux of the naval question could not be better stated than in the language of a recent editorial of the London Times:

"If Canada desires to add immediately to the fighting strength of the naval forces of the Empire, she can do so only in Mr. Borden's way. She cannot as yet build or man ships herself, and we can only help her to do so by gradual degrees. In view of practical as well as a patriotic plan, these conditions, Mr. Borden's is a better one to meet a pressing need, and offers them on terms which the Admiralty, with a clear eye to all its responsibilities, can wholeheartedly accept. The Admiralty policy is dictated by necessity; there is no room for choice. If the proposed Canadian ships were not to be made available in the manner which Mr. Borden suggests, the Admiralty, with the best will in the world to further the alternative plan, might still be compelled at the present juncture to keep its skilled and trained personnel for other available ships. It seems, indeed, that such a course may be dictated by the imperative requirements of Imperial security, which cannot be set aside in favor of any scheme, however well conceived, that neglects the present in pursuit of more distant aims. Mr. Borden's proposals will add at once to the effective naval strength of the Empire; Sir Wilfrid Laurier's would not."

THE most significant of those developments was the struggle for the active leadership of the Liberal party in the House. In the absence of Sir Wilfrid Laurier the acting leader is commonly supposed to be Hon. George Graham. He has been and is the Laurier selection. When Dr. Clark, of Red Deer, later in the evening was named by the speaker, the program failed through the ready action of the prime minister. Mr. Borden first wrote what onlookers took to be a motion for the suspension of the offending member. Then he advised Dr. Clark that it would be better if he were to obey the rule and apologize, which Dr. Clark did.
