A CHARACTER SKETCH OF LORD ROBERTS

An Outline of the Great Soldiers Leading Qualities
By Prof. Dean

In every age, a few persons by force of genius, talent or powerful character, rise above the level of the rest, and make themselves conspicuous marks of historic interest.

Lord Roberts was born in 1832 at Cawnpore and is 69 years of age. His organization is a very interesting study. He has a strong body and a strong mind. His muscles and bony framework are good and give him power and endurance for the labors of life. His features are strongly marked. See that nose. One remarkable feature about it is its length and the width of the wings, which denote good breathing power and ability to attend to details. Look at that ear, how large, how long and well formed, indicating long life and endurance. The head is high in the centre and shows a strongly-developed moral brain.

The two largest faculties of his mind are cautiousness and human nature. See that strong development on the upper side-head upwards and backwards from the ear, that is where the organ of caution is located; and human nature is found in the upper front just where the hair and forehead meet and give distance from the opening of the ear to that point.

These two faculties prevent him from being rash in his actions, and enable him to use forethought and judgment in what he does, and this undoubtedly is the secret of his past successes. He is a very active man, and it does not take him long to consider what is best to do in cases of emergency. The general shape of his head is long and high rather than broad, hence he will always be inclined to be just and merciful.

Lord Roberts will always excel in planning, and in planning a campaign his mistakes will be few indeed, for he takes into account all the details. I judge he inherits his forethought from his mother, and his stability and practical talent from his father. From a boy he was an observer and loved to study nature and scientific subjects. He would want to lead and tell other boys what to do. I do not think he was fond of study at school or would care for professional work. He would delight in reading books of travel and adventure, and would have made a good explorer, a good surveyor, would have been interested in mining operations and would have been a fine judge of minerals and cutlery. Although when a boy he was self-reliant, determined and manly, yet he loved his mother and obeyed her and could wait to be smooth and gentle.

He is a very firm man, but it is more a steady strength of character than it is obstinacy. He does not get angry and boil over. His first opinions of matters and things are generally his best. If he were driving a team and it got frightened, or the harness broke going down hill he would know just what to do at the first flash of thought. He can judge strangers, and if there was any conversation he would remember a good deal of what was said.

He is not a copyist; he maps his own way, lays his own plans, studies the conditions and reasons of things, and adapts himself to them according as he judges proper without inquiring to know how another man would do it or how it had been done.

Lord Roberts is a very ambitious man, and although not proud or greedy for power, yet prefers the place of leader to that of a follower. Observe the width of the head in the region of the temples where the organ of Constructiveness is located, this faculty combined with his intellect gives him organizing ability. He is not so harsh or unkindly severe. There is no lack of sympathy, or warmth of feeling as he is influenced by the highest motives in his work. He is not a great talker, and in expressing himself will use few words. He has not much taste for music, poetry, or art, and is plain in manners and speech. He would love to study astronomy. His resources are very great. When one plan fails he has another to take its place. I judge his social faculties were well marked, and that he would be fond of home and family and would make a good neighbor and reliable friend. He is prompt and punctual; thoroughness will mark all his undertakings.

He is moderate in hope and as his cautiousness is large he will not count his chickens till they are hatched and deserves. He gathers knowledge readily by observation and stores his mind with facts. He is adapted for an out-door active life and a pursuit in which mind and hands are equally employed. He is an honest man and can be relied upon to do the right thing. He is full of courage and daring. This general has had a brilliant career, and although advanced in years, it can be said "his natural force is not abated."

He is a born soldier in organization and mental power, and sprightliness, promptness, keenness of perception, and mental activity are leading traits in his character.

MR. GEO. WILLIAMS WRITES FROM AFRICA

And Describes Life in a Portuguese Town on the Eastern Coast

Mr. Geo. Williams formerly of the Flavell Milling Co. here but who less than a year ago went to Lorenzo Marques, writes as follows:
Lorenzo Marques, Feb 18th 1901.

I promised you to try to write a little description of my surroundings here.

Delagoa Bay is the best port in Africa as far as giving good shelter goes, but it needs a lot of harbor work such as dredging, piers and docks. Everything has to be brought ashore from ships by lighters. It is twenty miles from the entrance to the bay up to the town. Three rivers empty into the bay. The former two are good large rivers but salt water goes up a long distance. They bring fresh water down from the Umbulose to town in water boats. That is the only water supply for the town except rain water. There are two Protestant churches and no schools unless Portuguese. There is a Portuguese Catholic church. They have bull fights in town some Sundays but I have not seen any yet. I hear they are not like the Spanish, they are more cowardly. There are about four regular lines of steamers calling here but we don't get a regular mail. Sometimes we get a mail a week but often none for two weeks.

It was a very busy port when the Transvaal war opened but it has been quiet since we came. There is a fine English hospital ship here now being brought out this way.

There are no papers printed here only a Portuguese one called "O Tutos" which has one page printed in English.

The Lorenzo Marques Milling Co.'s mill is four miles across the bay from the town by water and about 8 miles by rail. We have railroad connection with the town. Four miles of this road was built by the Lingham Timber and Trading Co. to connect with the other railway.

We have a 200 barrel flour mill and 150 barrels of meal mill which we will increase to 300 barrels. All the timber for the mill and 50000 bushels elevator came from Oregon U.S.A already framed and was erected by the milling company in 1898.

The manager is Mr. Geo. Easterbrook formerly of Tweed Ont., and the secretary and bookkeeper is W. T. Easterbrook, his son also of Tweed Ont. It is all Canadian machinery in the mill of the latest kind. Here also is the timber yard of the Lingham Co., who handle immense quantities of Oregon pine, redwood and Baltic pine.

They also have yards in Pretoria and in Johannesburg. Mostly all the timber goes to the mines. They have some fine timber. Timber is worth from £20 to £30 per thousand so you see you can't build houses for nothing. Mr. Lingham, the president of the company, is a Canadian. Belleville was his home. There are Canadians all over Africa. I think you'll find some wherever you go.

The country around is not a success for agriculture. The soil is fertile enough but the insects and locusts destroy so much and the rains are not certain enough to make it pay. This has been a dry summer and the Kaffirs are short on their meals this year. The locusts come in clouds; sometimes will almost hide the sun from you and eat everything in sight that is green. Then they may go away and you don't see any more of them for a time but if it keeps dry they keep foraging all the time looking for green corn or something else tasty. Of course they would not be so lovin' minded as to eat weeds though.

I have never seen a burdock or a dandelion or thistle since coming here. There are not many large trees here—only a few wild fig trees that have their fruit growing on the back of the branches. Very odd to see it growing there.

We have a thorny, gummy tree called mimosa which has bloomed six times this year so far. It has a cluster of yellow flowers on it and gives nice perfume. There were no flowers this summer as it has been too dry for them.

We have a small deer which runs wild here no bigger than a calf or not so big. Game is quite scarce though sometimes you may see a

big jack rabbit or a partridge but not many of them.

There are a large number of Kaffirs around here who live in grass huts called kraals. They are a poor lot physically compared with some other tribes of Kaffirs owing to their dissipation. They go around mostly all the hot weather with just a cloth around their loins but some have a shirt also. Their feet are thick on the sole. They walk on anything and never feel it. The most of them can't speak any English so a person has his own troubles to make them understand him when he can't talk much Kaffir. They are a happy go lucky lot like the negro in the Southern States. As long as he gets a little meatie meal he don't care. They will work a while, then will want a rest for a week or two. They spent their money on Saturday night and Sunday on drink and few have much left over on Monday morning. The Kaffir buys his wife and pays about £20 or perhaps £25 for her. That constitutes native marriage. He can have as many as he can buy but when he gets three he then lets them keep him in ease. They do all the gardening, carry water, wood, and look after things in general. They carry heavy loads on their heads and a pickaninni on their back sometimes.

The weather has not been as hot as I expected here. Two days were very hot,—26th Dec. 192 in the shade and 14th Jan. 103 in the shade somewhat different from what you would have in Canada.

There are all kinds of insects here. A collector could get hundreds of different kinds. I can't tell much more about the place.

Eldon Township Council Proceedings

A meeting of the Township Council of Eldon was held at Lorneville on March 25th. The members were all present; the Reeve in the chair.

The following communications were read: From clerk of Brock township proposing that in future no statute labor be expended on townline between Eldon and Brock, but that the road on townline be maintained by money grants from each township. The clerk was directed to reply to the clerk of Brock assenting to this proposal. From the clerk of Blenheim township requesting the council to petition the Provincial legislature against the proposal to give the county council control of township roads. A petition to this effect was duly signed and the clerk was directed to forward the same to Mr. S. J. Fox, M.P.P., our representative in the provincial legislature.

From the secretary of the Home for the Aged, Lindsay, requesting that Donald McKay, an inmate of the home supported by the council, be furnished with a new suit of clothes, for best suit, in order that he may becomingly attend religious services on Sundays. This request was granted. From the Single Tax Association suggesting changes in the mode of assessment. The council took no action in this matter. From Allan G. Cavana, O. L. S., declining the office of township engineer on the terms embodied in the by-law appointing him such. This matter was laid over until the next meeting of council.

Tenders for the township printing were received from Watchman-Warder the Lindsay Post and from the Woodville Advocate. On motion of Mr. McArthur, seconded by Mr. Ross, the contract for the township printing was awarded to the Watchman-Warder.

A requisition from the trustees of S. S. No. 5 (Bolsover) was presented requesting the council to issue debentures to the amount of \$1,800 for the purpose of building a new school house. A by-law was duly passed by the council for this purpose.

A by-law was passed appointing pathmasters, fenceviewers and poundkeepers for the current year. A by-law was also passed empowering the Reeve and treasurer to borrow \$1,800 to meet the expenditure of the corporation for the current year.

The auditors report of the township accounts for the year 1900 was read and on motion of Mr. McArthur, seconded by Mr. Ross, was adopted. The clerk was directed to have 100 copies of the report printed for distribution.

On motion of Mr. McArthur, seconded by Mr. Ross, a resolution was passed bringing into force in this municipality the act respecting compulsory vaccination.

Mr. Wm. Hawkins Jr. addressed the council on behalf of Eldon Agricultural Society requesting a money grant in aid of the society. On motion of Mr. McDonald, seconded by Mr. McPherson, the council granted the sum of \$25 in aid of the society.

On motion of Mr. Ross seconded by Mr. McArthur, the following accounts were passed: Peter Graham payment on account of gravel pit on lot 18 in con 10, \$100; Hugh McLeod, for right of way to gravel pit on lot 18, con 10, \$15; McSweyn & Weldon, solicitors account, \$8.56; D. W. McIntyre, for work on 3rd con 84; S. Kerr for erecting railing on 5th con, lot 7, \$2; J. E. Dixon charity for Donald McKay, \$9.40; A. McFarlane, expense of conveying Donald McKay and Marion McArthur to Home for Aged, \$5; Home for the Aged, charity for Marion McArthur, \$7; M. J. Stoddart, coffin and shroud for Patrick McGuire, \$17; M. J. Stoddart, coffin for Maggie Kieth, \$15; Ann Mitchell, charity for Marion McArthur \$13; Ann Mitchell, charity for Maggie Kieth, \$4; A. Mc Gilvary, charity for Marion McArthur, \$9; D. McDougall, auditor, \$5; D. Howkins, auditor, \$5; members of B.O.H. for attending meeting of board \$2 each; G. Smith, ty engineer, for services re Annis drain, \$7.75; Geo. Ashman, for services re small-pox cases \$12.50; W. Fry, plank for Kirkfield sidewalks \$5; W. Fry, for gravel \$1.50.

The council then adjourned to meet again as a court of revision at Campbell's hotel, Kirkfield at the call of the Reeve.
