The Queen's Intention.

The Hague, April 7.—Queen Wilhelmina, who is at Castle Loob, has signified her intention to return to the Hague immediately if affairs of the state, arising from the strike situation, require her presence there. The Queen hopes that the precautionary measures taken to deal with the strikers will suffice.

Lake Fisher Mine Closed.

Shamokin, Pa., April 7.—The loaders and drivers of the Lake Fisher colliery refusing to obey the order of the commission to work 9 hours a day and demanding only 8 hours on Saturdays, have struck, and the entire mine is closed.

600 Carpenters Strike.

Salem, Mass., April 7.—The carpenters of Salem, Beverley, Peabody and Marblehead, 600 in all, have struck for a uniform scale. Notice of their intention was given last fall, but was unheeded by employers.

The Hour Question.

Pottsville, Pa., April 7.—The laborers at the Brookside Colliery have struck, pending a settlement of the hour question, as it relates to Saturdays.

ALL LINES TIED UP.

Dutch Transportation Strike is On in Full Force.

A PROTEST AGAINST LAW.

The Anti-Strike Measure the Cause of the Draconic Action of Employes—Attempt to Run Mail Trains With Military Protection—Regular Steamers Leave Rotterdam.

The Queen's Purpose.

Amsterdam, April 7.—At midnight a meeting of the Workmen's Committee proclaimed a general strike throughout Holland of all labor engaged in transportation, both by land and water. The meeting lasted until 4 o'clock yesterday morning.

All the railroad lines, stations and wharves are guarded by troops. The administration of the railroads has taken steps to secure the running of the foreign expresses under military protection.

The strike proclamation involves the entire railroad system and other land transport of Holland, and the water transportation of the important ports—Amsterdam, Rotterdam, Dordrecht and Zaandam, and is intended as a protest against the anti-strike laws, as well as to support the demand of the railroad men for an increase of wages before the passage of the laws made an improvement in their position impossible. The strike will likely spread to other branches of labor.

At the Hague, the troops are guarding the trains, and the Government is endeavoring to maintain a foreign mail service by troop-protected trains. The strikers have amused themselves tampering with the locomotives. All business is at a standstill, and the mail boats, which arrived, could not be unloaded.

At Rotterdam, the dock laborers, wagon drivers and all others engaged in industries connected with the port have joined the strike. Troops are at the station, and the shipping companies, trading with London and Hull have stopped work in sympathy. The Netherlands Railway have notified their striking employees that if work is not resumed in twenty-four hours their positions will be lost to them. Nine hundred out of 1,400 employees in the railroad workshops went out on strike. Arrangements are being made to transport the mails in motor cars. The diamond cutters have already resolved to strike out of sympathy with the cause.

The Anti-Strike Bills.

The Premier of the Netherlands, Dr. Kuiper, introduced in the Second Chamber of the States General three bills in connection with the railroad strike in Holland. He explained that the Government considered it necessary to oppose any unreasonable attack on society, which would sacrifice the well being of the people to the desire of a certain class for influence and to political tyranny. The Government, therefore, had proposed to form a railroad brigade to insure a regular service of trains in case of need.

One of the bills provides for a modification of the penal code with the object of affording a surer guarantee for the personal freedom of labor and of preventing State officials or persons engaged in occupations affecting public interests from absconding themselves from their duties. The bill further provides that refusal to do duty on the part of employees of the railroads or other public services may be punished by six months imprisonment. If two or more persons rise in rebellion, the penalty is increased to four years imprisonment or the ringleader or those left out.

The regular services left this port as usual yesterday but the work of loading other vessels is at a standstill. One thousand troops from the southern garrison have been assigned to duty at Rotterdam, but owing to the interruption of the train ser-

Algeria.

Algeria, which has 2,500,000 acres of cork forests, of which 300,000 are made to yield regular crops, is claimed to be the greatest cork producing country in the world.

Santo Domingo, April 6.—An engagement was fought April 2 at Parajito, the most severe since the outbreak of the rebellion. The contending forces used fire arms and cutlasses, and several persons inside the city were killed by stray shots. The insurgents were driven back to the city, but are full of fight, and compelled to abandon the capital, and will embark on the gumbato Independence, and join the rebels on the northern part of the island. The United States cruiser landed fifty marines to protect the American consulate, and attended many of the wounded in Wednesday's battle.

Must Fight Under Recognized Rules.

The members of the consular and diplomatic corps here met the same day, and appointed a commission to notify both sides that they must observe the rules of war, and to demand twenty-four hours' notice before any attack is made on the town, in order that the foreign residents may go to a place of safety.

All places of business are closed, and the situation is extremely critical.
