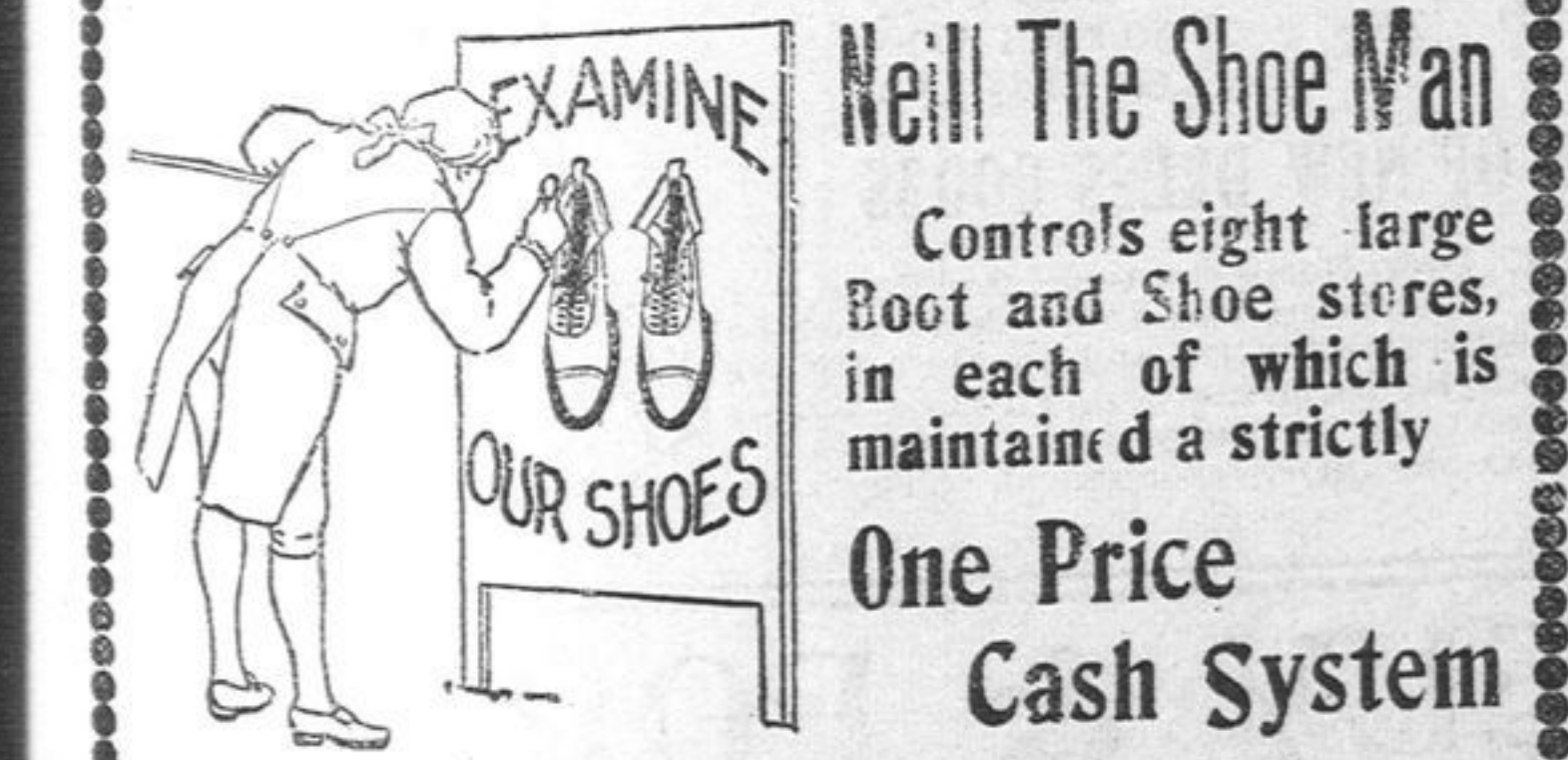

ST. ANDREW'S NEW PASTOR Rev. Jas. Wallace M. A., B. D. Was Ordained and Inducted Last Thursday

D., late of Queen's University, Kingston; a young man of perhaps 30, stalwart but modest, a likely-looking successor to McTavish Johnston and Macmillan and yet different enough from them all to warrant the belief that he will bring new elements to the body clerical of this town.

At the close of the second year in Divinity he carried off the Toronto Scholarship together with two special prizes, the Mackie prize in Church History and the Lewis for a prize essay. On a special examination at the end of the third year in Divinity he won the Leitch Memorial Travelling Scholarship, tenable for three years, besides again taking the Lewis prize for the prize essay, and graduated Bachelor of Divinity. During his last year in Arts and three in Divinity he was tutor in Latin and Greek. On the completion of his theological course he was awarded the fellowship in Hebrew which subject he has taught in the University for the last two sessions. In addition to lecturing in Hebrew he pursued post-graduate studies in Theology and Philosophy and at the recent examination was a gold medalist in first-class honors in these departments.

Mr. Wallace was also a prime favorite of the late Principal Grant, and was the one who was instrumental in launching and carrying out the scheme whereby a suitable memorial, viz. "The Grant Hall" will soon be erected to the man who was his ideal.

SOLDIERS KEEP THE PEACE IN MONTREAL WHARF STRIKE

A Thousand of them Sleep on Their Arms—Several Deeds of Violence On Tuesday 1000 soldiers were under arms in Montreal, and have taken possession of the river front. The longshoremen's strike, which had been talked about for days past had developed so rapidly that morning that the non-union men had to leave off work at once and in a very short time control of the situation. Mounted policemen were on hand, but could do nothing, and finally the Mayor was appealed to for protection. His Worship is charged with siding with the strikers. Lieut.-Col. Gordon, D.O.C., acting upon instructions, called out the Victoria Rifles, the 65th, the French-Canadian regiment, and the Duke of York Hussars.
