#### Seed Dispute

A case of a portion of seed not being equal to sample shown when selling, was decided at the last division court held in Lindsay by his honor Judge McMillan. A farmer of Emily sold 24 bags of alkali and red clover to a buyer east of Lindsay. The purchaser himself did not see the seed when delivered and had it re-shipped to another buyer. The second buyer claimed that four bags were inferior seed and would not accept them except at an allowance of \$2.60 per bushel on three bags of alkali and \$4.60 per bushel on one bag of clover. The original purchaser notified the farmer, claiming this allowance. Correspondence was produced where the farmer offered to accept both lots of seed back and refund the money if seed was returned within a week. The buyer offered to return the four bags which were not up to sample, but the farmer refused.  
 The buyer sued for claim he had to allow, as above, and obtained judgment for full amount with costs, the judge holding that when a sample of any article is shown as representing the quality offered for sale, it implies a guarantee that the article delivered must be equal to sample.
