SUMMER SESSION OF TORONTO UNIVERSITY.

The University of Toronto will conduct a summer session from July 3 to 31, to which the attention of public high school teachers and others is invited. The schedule of studies embraces art, botany, zoology, chemistry, physics, geology, and mineralogy, psychology, reading, voice culture and public speaking; French, German, etc. Prominent educators will give courses of lectures on each subject. The fee has been set at \$5.00 for the session, and those desirous of attending any of the courses should notify the secretary, Albert H. Abbott, at the University, not later than June 28.
