Little Local Lines

—Four or five inches of snow as late as April 16 is not unprecedented, but it is seldom that the temperature is as low as when the storm of Tuesday took place.

—License Inspector Thornbury has bought the house on Regent street next to School Inspector Knight from John C. Ray.

—Andrew Rutherford, employed in a lumber mill at Wilberforce, was brought by Mr. Thomas Bick to the Ross Memorial Hospital on Thursday of last week. One ear had been torn off and he had received other injuries from being kicked while in the stable by the horses he was looking after. He is making good progress to recovery.

—A successful birthday party was given by the Ladies Aid Society of Cambridge street Methodist church on Thursday evening of last week. Each person was expected to contribute as many cents as he or she was years old. The following took part in the program: The Misses Morson, piano duet; Mrs. (Dr.) Irwin, reading; Mr. Perkins, solo; Mrs. Perry, two readings; Miss Edyth Matthee, piano; Mrs. Blackwell, solo, assisted by Miss Edna Beal violin, and Miss Beall, piano; Miss Florence Cinnamon, reading, Miss Adams, a solo. Coffee, cake and sandwiches were served at the close of the program, and a social time enjoyed.

—The Ops swing bridge south of the town, was opened for traffic on Wednesday of last week.

—Rev. W. G. Smith, of Bobcaygeon, preached two excellent sermons in St. Andrew's church on Sunday. Rev. James Wallace preached at Bobcaygeon in the interests of the Augmentation Fund.

—Col. Sam. Hughes is having 15,000 copies of his speech in the Commons on Imperial Union printed and distributed among his constituents and others.

—On Thursday morning last a pile of straw behind the Montreal Bank was set on fire by the dumping of hot ashes on it. An alarm was sent in but the fire had been extinguished.

—The Department of Inland Revenue before the fire brigade arrived.

—He has found samples of butter adulterated with oleomargarine, and will institute prosecutions of the parties responsible.

—Dr. Sproule, Grand Master, announces that no decision has yet been come to as to whether the Grand Orange Lodge, of British America, will not be held in Vancouver, as originally intended.

—The West Victoria License Commissioners meet in Inspector Thornbury's office, Lindsay, on Saturday next at 2 p.m. to grant licenses for the ensuing year.

—Mr. George W. Mills, of the east ward, has been appointed by Superintendent McLeland, tender of the Lindsay and Wellington street bridges, thus leaving Lockmaster Makins free to devote his whole time to the lock and gates.

—Mr. J. D. Flavelle attended the semi-annual meeting of the Ontario Curling Association at Toronto on Tuesday. A notice of motion by him and Mr. T. O. Robson, "that hereafter only the immediate past president be a member of the executive was read and received favorably.

—License Inspector Thornbury is acting as Chief of Police in the absence for a few days of Chief Nevison.

—Seven beautiful gold watches for presentation to the Lindsay junior hockey team are on exhibition in the window of Hughan's jewellery store, on William street.

—Last Thursday night a meeting of the Board of Health was held, notice of the previous meeting not having been given Mayor Vrooman, and Chairman Horn called the meeting to avoid any objection to the former on account of irregularity. There were present Chairman A. Horn, Messrs. G. W. Mills, J. Keith and J. O'Reilly. The resolutions of the former meeting were all reaffirmed.

—The annual report of the Canadian Order of the Woodmen of the World shows that 1,200 new policies were issued during last year, and that the collections of assessments last year exceeded the death losses by \$11,307.01. The total number of certificates now in force exceeds 11,000.

—Mr. and Mrs. A. J. Ford were in Toronto and London most of last week where Mr. Ford was buying goods.

—Mr. Peter Wilson led the choir in Cambridge street church on Sunday and Miss Florence Jackson presided at the organ. The anthem in the morning was "The King of Love my Shepherd is", Shelley, the soloists being Mrs. Irvine, Mrs. Webster and Mr. Wilson. The latter also sang "One Sweetly Solemn Thought". Miss Jackson and Mr. Wilson are candidates for the positions of organist and choirmaster respectively.

—In a speech at Bowmanville, Geo. P. Graham, the Liberal leader, found the Whitney Government all wrong. What will be news to the people of this deluded Province.—(Oshawa Vindicator)

—Major Joseph Burke, ex-M.P.P., of Centre Grey, died last week at his residence on the farm near Heathcote at the age of seventy-five years.

—The following from the militia orders was inadvertently omitted last week:—15th Victoria Regiment: To be captain, with honorary rank of Captain, Rev. J. W. Wallace, vice Rev. J. W. Macmillan, who has been permitted to resign.

—Berk's Falls Arrow: Mr. W. J. Barnes, Provincial Diver, of Lindsay, under the supervision of Mr. William Kennedy, Superintendent of Public Works for Ontario, passed through Berk's Falls last week with his diving apparatus to assist Mr. Alex. Hiss, foreman of works at Magnetawan, when they engaged in repairing the dam, etc.

—Port Hope Guide: For a couple of years the by-law against spitting on the sidewalks was pretty well enforced. Now, however, the sidewalks are simply filthy from the effects of the vile habit. Ladies have to carry their skirts or have them made too dirty to be brought into a dwelling. As a matter of health this by-law should be enforced, and doubly so for the improved appearance of the town walks. The by-law has never been repealed, it simply requires to be enforced. What about Lindsay?

—Orilla Packet: There is every reason to expect that the Orange demonstration here on the 12th of July will be one of the largest of its kind ever held in Orilla. The committee certainly is sparing no pains to bring about this result. They have received assurances that lodges will come from north, south, east and west, including two lodges from Toronto. Among the speakers expected are Dr. Sproule, M.P.; Col. Sam. Hughes, M.P.; and Mr. R. C. Newman of Toronto. The committee is offering a prize of \$50 for the best Orange lodge, and of \$25 for the best True Blue lodge. Numbers, regalia and martial bearing will be taken into account.

—Peterboro' Examiner: Mr. Geo. Ball, sanitary inspector, is apparently allowing no loopholes in his attack upon unsanitary conditions that may exist. This morning he started on a tour of the junk yards and butchers' yards and killing pens, some exist, and will enforce it by frequent visits, especially to the junk yards, with notices that sanitary methods are in the city.

Main Business Portion of Hastings Burned.

Hastings, April 15.—One of the most destructive fires that ever visited Hastings broke out shortly after one o'clock this morning, destroying the Coughlan House, Hotel Buck and Buck's general store, the Howard block, O'Reilly's grocery, H. A. Wilson's gent's furnishing store, Traoy's bakery, P. M. Howard's grocery and liquor store, and Weldman's machine shop. A despatch was sent to Peterboro for aid, but within two hours after the alarm was sent in all the places of business on Front street west of the bridge were completely destroyed. The aggregate loss is estimated at nearly eight thousand dollars.
