Last Thursday she gave birth to three calves. One was dead but two are alive and doing well, a steer and a heifer. She has before had twins.

—The annual report of City Engineer Hays, of Peterboro, shows that the Board of Works expended \$18,785.52 last year. Nearly 5 miles of sewers were laid on 49 streets, 6.4 miles of permanent walks were put down, with 65 crossings, two bridges were given concrete tops, 3050 cubic yards of gravel spread on the streets.

### FAT WOMAN FELL ON HIM.

Skater Dies As Result of Peculiar Accident. Vandergraff, Pa., April 3.—Abner McGary, a wealthy merchant and real-estate president of Vandergraff County, is dying at his home as a result of an accident in the Apollo roller skating rink.

McGary, who is a good roller skater, notwithstanding he is fifty years old, tripped and fell. Immediately behind him was a woman weighing over 300 pounds. The woman fell on McGary, and in a moment he was crushed under a mass of struggling skaters.

When McGary was reached he was unconscious. An examination developed that the man's pelvic bone was crushed and he had sustained other internal and dangerous injuries.

Seeks Mrs. Mason For Gems. Windsor, April 3.—A son of John R. Swindon of the Flying Roller community says that he will apply to Chief of Police Willis for a warrant for the arrest of "Mother Elmor," Mrs. Mason, to recover \$10,000 worth of jewels she is said to be wearing.

The rings were obtained by the elder Swindon in the British army in India. One ruby is said to be an inch in diameter and to be worth \$1,500. It is said Lewis P. Newman, a Toronto mining stock broker, would like to find the woman and get from her \$300 which he lent her while she was in Toronto last winter, pretending to negotiate a big Cobalt deal.

There is little hope that Mrs. Mason will be caught.

### Big Canal Open In 8 Years.

Kansas City, Mo., April 3.—Representative Edgar C. Ellis, who has just returned from the isthmus of Panama, said Monday night:

"In eight years ships will be going through the Panama Canal. It will cost \$500,000,000, but we will build it. The army has got hold of it and can do it. I always was convinced that it could not be built by contract."

### Busse Defeats Dunne.

Chicago, April 3.—The most intense campaign in municipal politics that Chicago has experienced in many years closed last night with the election of Frederick A. Busse, the Republican candidate for mayor, over Edward P. Dunne, his Democratic rival and a candidate for re-election. Busse's plurality was between 15,000 and 18,000 votes.

### Held Fast in Train's Path.

Emmerson, Man., April 3.—With his foot caught in a frog and unable to extricate himself, Brakeman Fyvie, who runs on the mixed train between this town and Winnipeg, was run down and killed yesterday in the C. P. R. yards.

He was a resident of Winnipeg and leaves a widow and grown-up family.

### China Orders 2,000,000 Rifles.

Berlin, April 3.—According to a despatch received here from Shanghai, the Chinese Government has ordered, through German firm at Tientsin, through 2,000,000 rifles for the uniform equipment of the Chinese army.

### KILLED BY DYNAMITE.

Italian on Railway Work Meets Death Near Ancaster. Hamilton, April 3.—Tony Panzini, an Italian employed by Nicholson and Riley contractors, on the Hamilton-Brantford Electric Railway, was killed yesterday evening by an explosion at Horning's Mills, near Ancaster. Panzini was engaged blasting rock. A charge of dynamite did not go off as quickly as he thought it should and he started towards the spot where the charge was set to see what was the matter. He got within a few feet of it when there was an explosion, and he was blown about a hundred feet. He was unconscious when assistance reached him and died shortly afterwards.

### ALFONSO'S MOTHER ILL.

Queen Cristina Has Serious Attack—Sacraments Administered. Madrid, April 3.—Queen Cristina, King Alfonso's mother, is confined to her bed with a very severe attack of grip, her temperature reaching 40 degrees centigrade (104 degrees Fahrenheit). She has received the last sacrament, and her physicians refuse to make any prediction as to the progress of her illness.

Queen Cristina, who is 49 years old, was about to go to Cartagena, where King Alfonso is meeting King Edward. Her illness, coming at this time, is especially unfortunate, owing to the interesting condition of Queen Victoria, her daughter-in-law.

### MONTREAL IS HAPPY.

Large Increase in Customs Revenue in Canada's Premier City. Montreal, April 3.—The fiscal year 1906-7, which has just closed, has been a banner one in the history of the Port of Montreal, the collections of Customs duties on imports having been greater than ever before since Montreal became a Customs port, which is quite a number of years.

The heaviest month in this year was November last, with \$488,000, and March just ended was a good second, with an increase of \$207,577.90 over March in 1906. December last was the poorest month, when only \$1,107,148.78 was gathered in for the national treasury.

The increase for the nine months just ended over the corresponding months of the previous year totals \$1,523,528.35. Total collections for the same months were \$11,427,595, against \$9,925,067 for the previous fiscal year.

### GIVEN HIS SEAT.

S. J. Donaldson Takes His Place in Saskatchewan Legislature. Regina, Sask., April 3.—For the first time in the history of Canada, a seat was given to a member in a Legislative Assembly without the polling of votes.

The Saskatchewan Legislature yesterday afternoon declared that Samuel J. Donaldson, Provincial Rights candidate in Prince Albert district, was duly elected.

The decision of the Legislature was made on account of the revelations showing the most brazen crooked work in the election of Mr. Donaldson's opponent, among the acts being the marking in the bush by deputy returning officers of enough ballots to give the Government candidate a clear majority.

### Huxley and Hunt in Canada.

One is sometimes disposed to consider "what might have been" in connection with Canada and Canadian institutions. For instance, Holman Hunt, the painter of that famous picture, "The Light of the World," once thought of coming to Canada to take up farming. Hunt has made Canada more artistic and have wrought out his great works here, or would he have become a poor farmer instead of a great painter; or for Canada. But an even more interesting speculation is that concerning Huxley, who once came near being a professor of Toronto University. Would the great scientist have been as successful as he was in England, or would the environment have cramped his energies? Would Huxley have been promoted and appreciated, or would he have been misunderstood and kept down, dwarfed for want of material and inspiration? In any event, it is in such men a nation lives and the more Canada can attract or develop the more rapid will be progress, the deeper and fuller her current of life.

### Luxury For Paupers.

One of the members of the Epsom Board of Guardians, on the occasion of a recent visit to the workhouse, recorded his impressions in the visitors' book as follows: "I have inspected the house, and it seems to me the most comfortable dwelling-house in the 'emp."

### St. Lawrence Is Receding.

Montreal, April 10.—Contrary to all precedents, the water in the River St. Lawrence is receding at a time when it is customary for it to go up with a rush and threaten floods.

### Convicted of Murder.

Rocheester, N. Y., April 10.—The jury in the case of Fred Schultz returned a verdict of murder in the second degree last yesterday, for killing Edward Pullman, the village watchman at Soduse, on March 22 of last year, during a robbery of the bank.

### The Peace Conference.

The Hague, April 10.—Two o'clock in the afternoon, June 15, has been fixed for the opening of the second peace conference here.
