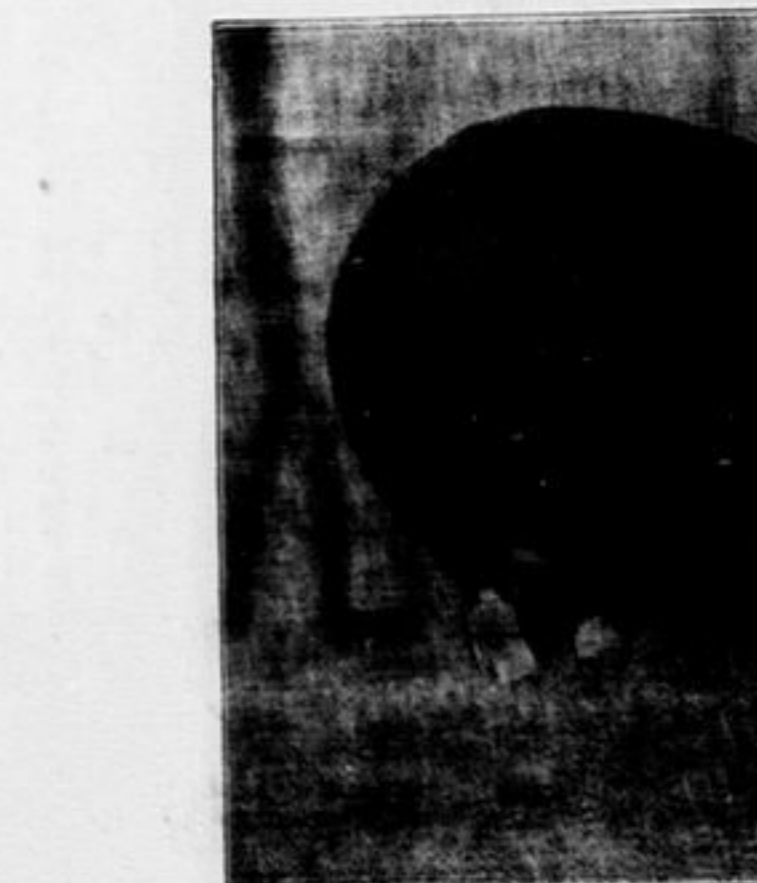

LIVE STOCK SPECIAL TRAIN
Co-operating with the Iowa State
Agricultural College, the Chicago &
North Western Railway will run a Live
Stock Special Train over its lines in the
State of Iowa from March 27th to April
15th. The train will consist of three
lecture cars especially equipped, one car
to be designated as the "Men's Car" in
which lectures and demonstrations will
be given on the subject of how the
farmer can make more profit from hogs,
illustrated with charts, model hog
houses, glass jars showing parasitic
diseases and also jars showing tubercu-
lar specimens; also indicating how hog
cholera can be prevented with Govern-
ment Hog Cholera Vaccine manufactured
by the state, and a sample of this vaccine
will be on exhibition.
A copy of "The Hog Grower's Ten
Bules," giving a few simple rules which,
if followed out, would add about \$15,000-
000 annually to the pork production of
the state, will be distributed at the
close of lectures.
Another car is designated as the
"Ladies' Car," in which lectures and
demonstrations showing cooking and
serving meats alone and in combination
with other foods will be given, illus-
trated with charts showing nutritive
value of the different cuts of meat,
where located, how to cook the cheapest,
and obtain an appetizing manner, etc., etc.

Lorneville, April 17.—The closing
exercises of the Lorneville public

were "The School Journal," which
was such as to cause the editors of
the journalistic world to fear future
