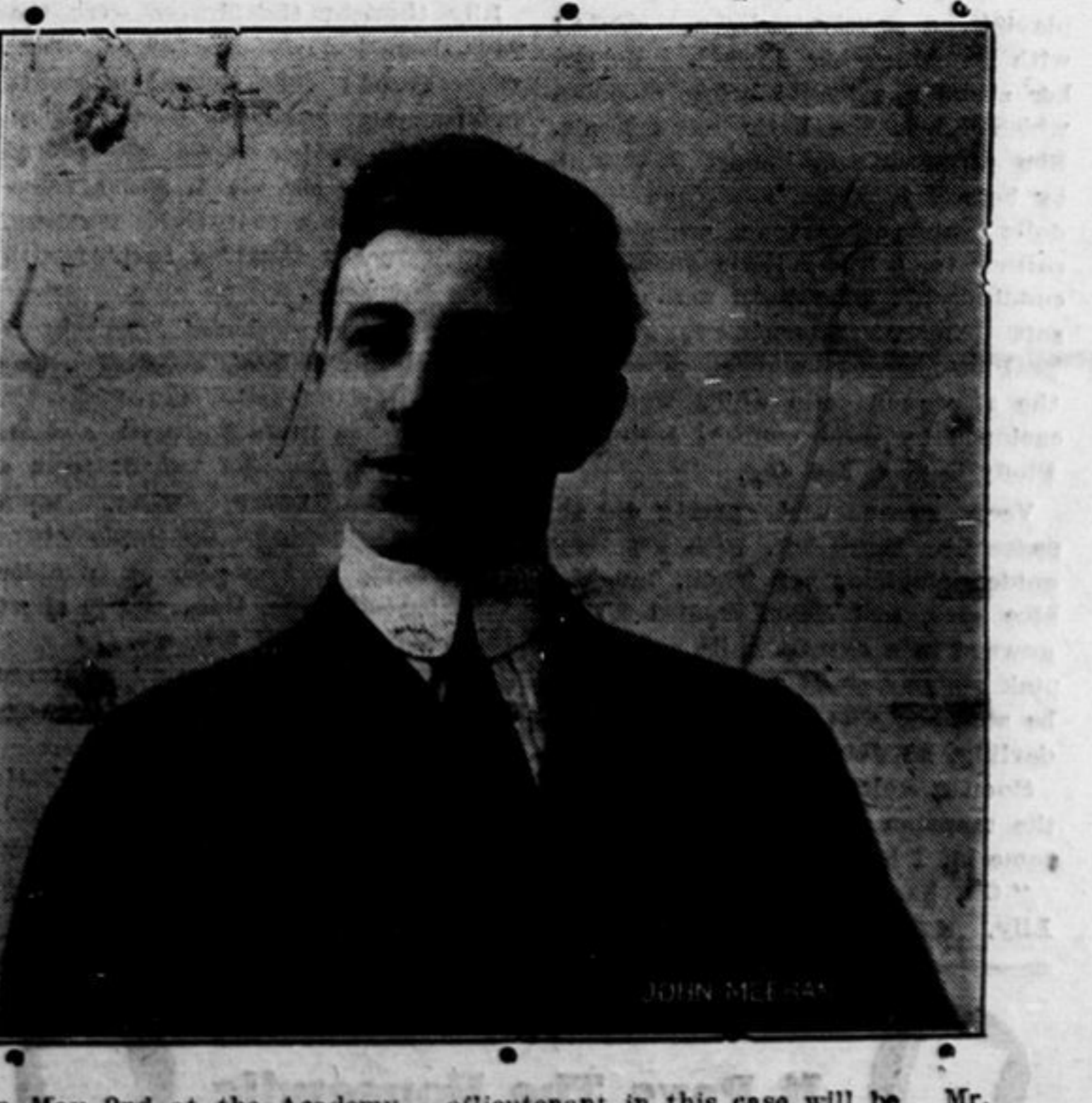
of this. He said it would shorten the road between Cameron and Lindsay and save climbing a big hill.
