Lesson V.—Second Quarter, For April 30, 1911.

THE INTERNATIONAL SERIES.

Text of the Lesson, Jonah III, 5, to IV, 11—Memory Verses, Chapter IV, 10, 11—Golden Text, Matt. xxviii, 19. Commentary Prepared by Rev. D. M. Stearns.

The committee calls this a foreign missionary lesson, and it is certainly a grand missionary story, reaching on even to the kingdom when it shall be fully seen that "salvation is of the Lord" (II, 6). With this saying of Jonah I have in my mind the words of the Lord Jesus to the woman of Samaria, "Salvation is of the Jews" (John IV, 12).

We have in our lesson the only instance, as far as I know, of a whole nation repenting. But when Israel shall have had her resurrection from the dead and a nation of Pauls shall go forth into all the world witnessing as He did in the power of the Spirit, knowing all languages and having all wealth at their command, whole nations will turn to the Lord in true repentance and "All kings shall fall down before Him, all nations shall serve Him" (Ps. lxxii, 11).

Could there be a more vivid picture of the churches' indifference to the command of Christ in our Golden Text than that of Jonah on this ship? The only man who knew the true God is fast asleep, while the heathen sailors are diligently calling upon their gods. They only found out who he was and why he was there by questioning him.

With all Jonah's peculiarities he seems to have been a man full of the word of God, for his prayer in chapter II is almost wholly Scripture. In the margin of my Bible I note in my prayer nine quotations from or references to the Psalms, besides some from other parts of Scripture.

It would be a great thing and greatly to the glory of God and the good of both speakers and hearers if all preachers and teachers would prove themselves to be "the Lord's messengers in the Lord's message unto the people" (Hag. I, 13). All such might rest assured that His word will always accomplish His pleasure and never return to Him void (Isa. LVII, 10).

Concerning God's repentings mentioned in chapter III, 10, and in so many other places in Scripture we must remember that God cannot and never does change His mind about anything, for He knew everything from the beginning (Acts xv, 18), but He does change His mode of procedure, and as God always knew that He would be just at that place in history and in that way.

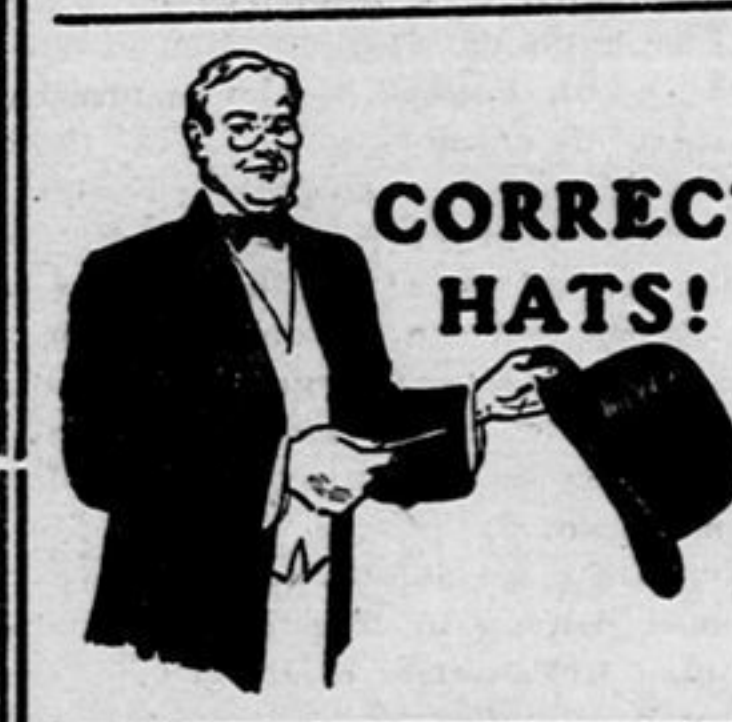

Salaries in Ontario Schools

From the Minister of Education's report for 1910 we learn that school teachers throughout the Province are getting higher salaries than they did the previous year. In the urban schools the average for male teachers is \$1,000, an increase of \$14 over 1909, and for female teachers \$532, an increase of \$16. In rural schools the average salary has increased \$22, being \$484. Female teachers in these schools are receiving \$17 more, the average being \$399.

Local Option By-Law at Beaverton

Following is the report of the case of Henry Sturmer, of Beaverton, to quash the local option by-law before Justice Middleton: Judgment: There were 169 votes cast in favor of the by-law and 111 against, so that 1691 (167) votes were necessary to give the statutory majority, and it is claimed that the by-law should be quashed, if it can be shown that three votes were improperly cast. The judges of the Court of Appeal "concurring in the result" in Ellis v. Renslow used that expression advisedly, signifying that they agree in dismissing the appeal because the appellant had not successfully attacked a sufficient number of votes and that they did not intend to express concurrence in the view that even nine votes had been well impeached and that they did not determine this question. This leaves the Schumacher decision binding upon me, and the clerk's vote is allowed. Tears' and Madill's votes are good and McArthur's vote is bad, he having moved permanently from the municipality before the election. I also hold that Arthur Jones and Ann McIcrae had the right to vote. As to Ann McIcrae's vote the deponents are acting improperly when as here they violate their oath of secrecy and disclose what took place. As to McIcrae's vote the clerk acted quite properly in putting the ballot, by accident placed in the wrong box, in the right one without opening it or disclosing how marked, and this cannot void the election. There is no foundation for the charge that secrecy was violated at polling subdivision No. 2. In the result the attack fails and is dismissed with costs. I have not to consider the question whether in the event of my finding that there were votes enough properly cast to possibly affect the result, I should try to ascertain how these votes were cast. This would be an extension of the West Lorne case requiring very careful consideration. The court has power to quash a by-law for illegality. Illegality is shown when it appears that the by-law was passed upon the vote of not qualified voters, but of the qualified voters plus certain persons having qualification. In order to ascertain whether these affected the result the number of bad votes is compared with the majority. Must the court then quash, or can
