Seeding Three Years Ago in Emily. Three years ago this spring farmers through Emily and Manvers were busy ploughing and preparing for planting of grain. Still the seeding was late that year.

Potato Canker The attention of the farmers of this district is called to the fact that there exists in England and other European countries a potato disease called potato canker, and that this disease has been found in Newfoundland. Since the disease which has borne a disease crop will carry the disease spores for some years. Care should then be taken when buying seed potatoes to examine them thoroughly in order to avoid the planting of diseased tubers. Bulletin No. 63 issued by the Dominion Dept. of Agriculture contains a full description of this pest.

125,000 American Settlers Brought in \$125,000

Washington, March 27.—The sum of \$125,000,000 was taken to Canada by 125,000 Americans, who were attracted to various provinces of the Dominion by lands that were procured practically for the making. Iowa and other states of the northwest declined in population, or failed to show normal increases in the decade between 1900 and 1910. Western members contend that this condition of affairs is directly traceable to the more liberal laws governing the disposal of the public domain in the Dominion. While the population of the northwest is decreasing, or failed to increase, the population of Canada is increasing at the rate of 1,000 a day. Canada is drawing on this country to increase her population and the farming regions of the border States are yearly losing thousands of citizens who are attracted to the provinces by lands given in patent to settlers at low prices and on terms that are favorable otherwise.

Emily Man Killed by Train at Vancouver

Word has been received in town of the death of William Callaghan, which occurred at Vancouver on March 22. Very few particulars are at hand, but it appears that the late Mr. Callaghan was struck by a Great Northern train on the 19th, succumbing to his injuries three days later.

The deceased was well known in Lindsay and the vicinity, having formerly resided in North Emily. Two years ago he left for the coast with his family. He was about 58 years of age. Among the relatives of the deceased in this section are: Messrs. John Meehan, Lindsay; Jos. Meehan, of Ops, and Patrick Meehan, of Downville, all brothers-in-law of the deceased.

He announced that he was about to undertake a survey of 1,000 sq. miles of waste lands in Eastern Canada, principally in Haliburton and Peterboro Counties, in behalf of the Conservation Commission, with a view to discover causes for their present condition, what that condition is, and what remedies can be applied to restore them to usefulness. Fires were said to be the principal causes, and in some cases the land had been farmed when it should not have been. There was a large attendance at the meeting.—Mail and Empire.

The directors of the Victoria Loan and Savings Co. met at the home of Mr. W. Flavell Friday to present Mr. J. Low with an illuminated address and purse of gold. Mr. W. Flavell, president of the company, acted as chairman, and read the address, while the purse was presented by Mr. W. H. Stevens. An elaborate supper was served, which was enjoyed by all, previous to the address and presentation.

Apartments Broken into by Burglars

What is supposed to be a daring attempt at burglary was perpetrated on Wednesday about eleven o'clock when some man (name unknown) forced open the door leading into the apartments of Mr. and Mrs. Robt. Stevens, who live above Newton's grocery store on Kent-st. Mr. and Mrs. Stevens, and two children had just nicely retired to the third floor for the night, when the flicker of a match in a room below was noticed, the light which followed, penetrating a small aperture in the ceiling, and the mummbling of voices attracted their attention. Mr. Stevens hastily donned a few garments and rushed down stairs to the second floor, and on hearing him coming the burglars hastily made a retreat. With the broom, which he held in his hand, Mr. Stevens pounced on to the intruder as he was going out of the door, and hit with such force that the broom handle was broken, and the would-be burglar stumbled out across the hall against the door leading into the apartments of Mr. W. M. Morton. He regained his feet and rushed down the stairs with the disturbed citizen after him. The burglar, who is described as a fairly tall man, dressed in dark clothes and wearing a cap, took leg bail, turned the corner and was lost in the shadows of the livery barns on York-st.

Mr. Stevens immediately called upon Night Constable John Short, who was on the spot in less than five minutes time and made a close investigation. The various rooms were searched for traces of the bold intruder, but despite his hasty retreat he failed to leave anything behind by which he might be identified.

Constable Short after satisfying himself that the burglar and his companion had decamped, proceeded to take a look around the vicinity, and also visited the various hotels, but no suspicious characters were noticed.

Mr. Stevens, who has been working for the Cornell Brewing and Malting Company, in conversation with a Warder man stated that he had been busily engaged in packing up, and the house was in a topsyturvy condition. That the burglar was a bold one is evident from the fact that the door, which was bolted, was forced open. However, the housekeeper had no time to get away with any household goods, as the family had fortunately only retired, and were not asleep.

Constable Short was on the lookout to-day for suspicious characters and it is expected that there will be further developments in the case.

BIG PRICE FOR SEED POTATOES

Two sleigh loads of potatoes were on sale yesterday at the market. They were picked up by anxious farmers for seed purposes. At the present price the seeding of an acre this coming season will cost the farmer about \$25.00, as from 18 to 20 bushels per acre is required. To the ordinary farmer in Victoria County, this extra cost is not noticeable, but in eastern Ontario in the vicinity of Ottawa where 20 and 40 acres are put in crop each year, a large expenditure will result. This preparation of the soil, and the late of new seed which is very much needed, and is in itself a means of increasing the yield. Many farmers have not been growing more than 75 and 100 bushels of potatoes to the acre, owing to inferior and playing out seed, which by a proper and judicious selection of the greatest producers from 200 to 400 bushels can be grown. While speaking of seed and its relative value to the insured of a big return, it might be well to mention a word as to the preparation of the soil, and the late of planting. Take any ordinary clay or sandy loam that has received a dressing of barnyard fertilizer, plough in the fall, let this stand in the spring until perfectly dry, then disc harrow the land, or run over it with the gang plough and harrow. Do not interfere with the ground then until after the first of June, when a similar cultivation is essential. Drill and plant about the 10th of June and not earlier. Keep the cultivator and potatoe plough going between the rows as potatoes rejoice in fresh moulded clay, through the moisture. Those simple instructions followed, will ensure a big yield. The reason for late planting, is that the potatoe being a native of a warm country, requires heat and moisture—not too much rain—to bring it to its greatest size and maturity.
