MODERN EDUCATION

An address on education, prepared by Principal Kirkconnell for the Twenty Club, was repeated, through the kindness of Mr. Stewart, chairman of the board of education last evening, to members of the town council, board of education, separate school board and male teachers of the town, who gathered to the number of about thirty at Mr. Stewart's home and enjoyed his hospitality. Mr. J. D. Flavelle acted as chairman.

The paper contrasted educational conditions half a century ago with present-day methods and found improvements in:
(a) The body of teachers in charge of our schools who were (1) thoroughly trained both in the best methods of teaching them.
(b) The program of studies which had been greatly enriched by the addition of culture subjects, such as literature, drawing, and enjoyment of life in the adult.
(c) The subjects were now taught in a rational way, the mind being in great measure relieved from the drudgery of mere memorizing in geography, grammar, etc., and an appeal made to the intelligence of the children.
(d) Discipline was the higher nature of the child rather than through fear.

It had been found that the best results were reached in any subject by a very moderate expenditure of time, and that when more than this time was spent no extra progress was made, but rather the opposite. So that music and elementary art and domestic science, etc., were not crowding the important subjects out, but afforded a welcome relief from too long continued application to the very best mental stimulus for the boy who is to enter professional life.

The paper was very fully discussed by those present and the feeling was very general that a great step forward would be taken if ways and means could be provided to add these two subjects to the school program.
