The Sheep Industry

(To Editor of Watchman-Warder) Dear Sir,—In your last week's issue I noticed an article entitled "The Sheep Industry in Victoria County." This article contained an account of the first wool marketed in Lindsay this season, etc., and closed with the following questions left open for answers by practical sheep men: Question No. 1. "What are the reasons you attribute for the decline of the sheep industry in Canada? Now, Mr. Editor, having been among sheep practically all my life, and studied carefully all possible conditions regarding same, my answer to your question is "Lack of protection by our governments."

During the year 1911 Canada imported about 178,000 head of sheep for butchering purposes, and over 3,000,000 pounds of mutton, and when the farmers of Ontario want to sell their wools they are told by the stock buyers a story something like this: "Well, you see sheep are rather dull just now, all the large abattoirs are filled up with this New Zealand mutton, that comes as a rule a little cheaper, for they say better conditions for raising sheep there; less winter feeding, etc." The same applies to wool; we want more duty on wool coming into our country.

I understand there is a duty of something like three cents a pound on wool coming into this country, on all wools similar to that grown in Canada but that duty is evaded by importers declaring that there is no wool imported similar to that grown in Canada, in fact some even go so far as to say Shropshire wool grown in England is not similar to Shropshire wool grown in Canada. Well, maybe it isn't just the same, but when it comes down that close, the duty would be better collected.

Your question No. 2—"Judging from your own practical experience, do you believe that sheep can be made to pay a reasonable profit under existing circumstances?" Yes; I believe they can, I haven't had much experience regarding commercial sheep being mostly entrusted to fine breeds, but with wool at 12c to 15c unwashed as it is at present, and lambs selling at 7c and 8c a lamb as well as the grand champion pound, surely there is good money to be made.

We often notice articles in newspapers regarding exceptional cases where pure bred stock have made the owners money, but here is a case that is not an exceptional one. Last January Mr. E. A. MacKenzie, of the Department of Agriculture, Lindsay, came to our place for the purpose of selecting three ewes to lecture on at a proposed short course of jugging to be held at Woodville-stormy weather prevented this. We selected three ewes, having no other purpose in view but to get three of the best conditioned sheep in our ordinary breeding flock at that time.

In looking over my books I found one of these ewes to have made me \$117.30 as well as having the honor of being the grandmother of the best wether in America in 1911, and the mother of one other three ewes selected for the same purpose had made \$118.50 as well as having the honor of being the mother of the best Shropshire ram at Ottawa exhibition 1911, he being sold at that show to head the flock at the Central Experimental Farm.

I could tell you of other ewes in our flock that have made a permit, but before I close, just a word about the breed. I will leave it to Mr. Mark, Mr. Cullis and others to boom their own particular breed, but for me let the breed be Shropshire. "Shepherd Boy" in his book entitled "Modern Sheep Breeds and Management," gives us the following description of this beautiful breed. "What is more charming, or seductive than a well bred Shropshire yearling ewe? That charming, yet graceful creature of some aristocratic pose—purely Shropshire in type—that scale and plumpness of form; that superb skin and fleece; that sweet and smiling countenance; that well bonneted head and somewhat heavily veiled face; that spring of leg, smoothness and fullness of rump and twist together with the sweet disposition ever dispensed to our domestic friends, constitute such harmonious blending of the beautiful with the useful as makes it extremely fascinating and worthy of the status of the best of the breed. I don't really believe that we have a poor breed of sheep in Victoria County; we have Cotswolds, Leicesters, Oxford Downs, a few Southdowns, and a good percentage of Shropshires, all of good breeds are good and each of them some particular case. There is no one breed going to corner the sheep market in Victoria County, but the greatest trouble there is too much mixing of breeds. There is no use using a Cotswold sire one year to increase the size of your flock, then a Leicester the next year because he is handy, and a Shropshire the year after because you have heard they are hardy and stand rough weather, better, and next year a Southdown because you have read in a newspaper that they were noted for good mutton. Such a course as this will always end in dissatisfaction, and small if any profits. Our experience has taught us that there is only one cross worth trying, and that is a cross between a Leicester ewe and a Shropshire sire. Now, this is not a guess for have I not selected wethers right here on our own county from such a cross of breeding that have won first place at the Winter Fair at Guelph two years in succession, as fat grade and cross-bred lambs; one year in a class of twenty four entries, another year thirteen entries, and this year the champion of the show. A shewling was also sent from here as a wether of America, this last season. There is no cross that will beat it, but after all it is very seldom that a cross bred can be made to overcome a pure bred. "Since his taking over the city solicitorship Mr. McDiarmid has made a host of friends in the city hall service as well as outside. He has had cast upon him one of the most difficult of civic positions, the legal status of many civic matters when he arrived having been very much a puzzle. The retiring official has always been fearless and energetic, his opinion to the council always carrying weight with the members of the aldermanic board and subsequently proving sound. "Mr. McDiarmid came to Victoria from Lindsay, Ont., where he had long experience in municipal affairs, having been legal representative of that municipality for some time, and served upon the municipal council. Municipal law has been his forte and his services with the city have brought out his peculiar ability in that respect. He will be succeeded by Mr. T. Reginald Robinson, K.C., formerly a member of the firm of Borden, Ritchie & Robinson, the senior member of which is now the Hon. Mr. E. L. Borden, premier of the dominion. Mr. Robinson arrived in the city a month ago and after taking his examinations returned last to settle up his affairs. He is back again and will enter upon his new duties to-morrow."
