THE OVER-CHAPERONED

American mothers seem to be divided into two classes—one that never looks after its daughters at all or protects them and the other that watches its daughters so closely that it makes them prisoners. And between the two types of mothers it is hard to judge which is worse.

There are altogether too many mothers who seem to feel that they have a little responsibility toward their girls as the birds do toward the fledglings that they have pushed out of the nest. These mothers will get a little immature, ignorant girl go with people they do not know, attend parties and go to places with young men whom they do not know by sight and come home at any hour their daughters to receive men visitors of whom they know nothing, to carry on correspondence with strange men, and to visit others girls in distant cities of whose family and habits, and character they are totally ignorant.

Every day we see girls in queer places, doing queer things, that make us wonder if they have mothers, and if so, what their mothers are doing that they are not keeping a better watch upon their daughters. For it is a mother's duty to keep her eye on her girl, and to safeguard her with a knowledge and experience that it is impossible that youth should have.

CHAPERONING OVERDONE.

On the other hand, there are 'also too many mothers who overdo chaperoning, and in their zeal to protect their daughters they stand such a perpetual guard over the girls that the poor things are in jail with mamma doing sentry duty at the door.

And in this land of liberty, where the chaperon, at best, is an imported article that we have never taken kindly to, a mother can ruin her daughter's prospects just as actually by over-chaperoning her as she can by not chaperoning her at all.

Take this case, which is a real one, as an example. Among my acquaintance there is a certain jolly little brown wren of a girl, who is just as sound and wholesome as a red-cheeked apple. She is merry and bright and attractive, and many men who are enchanted with her when they first meet her, follow up the acquaintance by going to see her. But never but once do they call.

The reason is the girl's entire time she sits in the parlor the entire time of the man's call, looking like a forbidding dragon. She takes no part in the conversation. She makes no effort to be agreeable or companionable. She just sits up in a frozen silence, seeming to invite to the poor, innocent man that she suspects him of being a wolf in sheep's clothing, and that she is there to protect her ewe lamb from him.

Remains of Late Mr. Meagher Taken to Kirkfield by Special Train

A special train arrived in Lindsay on Monday from Joliette, Que., conveying the remains of the late Patrick John Meagher, who passed away Saturday, as a result of an accident some two weeks previous. The special train proceeded through to Kirkfield, where interment took place.

Some two weeks ago the deceased young man, who for a number of years resided in Lindsay, and who was employed with the Canadian Northern Railway as Electrical Engineer, met with an accident, which laid him up. It appears that he was stepping on to one of the engines, when he slipped, breaking a couple of ribs. One of the fractured ribs pierced his lungs, pneumonia setting in, causing death.

The late Mr. Meagher is survived by his mother, father, two brothers: Messrs. William and Arthur, and two sisters, Mrs. Martin J. Kenny, of Port Arthur and Miss Mabel, of Toronto. A NEW RECORD.

A registered Holstein heifer, four years old, owned by Wm. C. Stevens, Phillipsville, Leeds County, has completed a seven-day record of 472.72 lbs. of milk, 30.857 lbs. of fat, 38.57 lbs. of butter. The average per cent. of fat was 6.6. This is said to be the largest record ever made by any cow of any age or breed being the first time the world's dairy record has been held in Canada.

Borden's First Parliament

The first session of Premier Borden's first Parliament has come to an end, and, despite the disparagement that was to have been expected from disgruntled Opposition papers, a great deal of important and far-reaching legislation has been accomplished. There is plenty of time yet in the present Parliament to bring many facts to light that the Liberal party would gladly see consigned to oblivion. In the brief time in which the Borden Government has been in power, however, it has wisely refrained from neglecting the affairs of the Dominion simply for the gratification of showing up the unquitting administration. Many of these will come to light of themselves in the course of events.

In the mean time the Borden Government has been doing things. Among the items of legislation dealt with are the following:

Settled the Manitoba, Ontario and Quebec boundary extensions.

Voted funds for the construction of the Hudson Bay Railway and terminals.

Abolished the N. T. Railway Commission and placed the work under one expert commission.

Voted subsidy to the T. & N. C. Railway.

Passed the grain bill, providing improved transportation and elevator accommodation in the West.

Appointed a commissioner to report on immigration.

Voted \$1,000,000 to improve highways throughout Canada. Killed by Senate.

Voted 9500,000 to improve agriculture, and appointed C. C. James to get it under way.

The cadet system has been recognized as part of the national militia.

Dropped the Laurier Government's navy building program pending a conference with the British Admiralty.

Negotiations begun for trade reciprocity with the West Indies and Australia.

Act for creation of a tariff commission passed. Killed by Senate.

A rural delivery branch attached to the Post Office Department.

The question of a Federal marriage law referred to the Supreme Court.

Provision made for settling the claims of Fenian Raid veterans.

Provision made for the appointment of new judges.
