When the bank suspended on Tuesday, December 20, 1910, W. R. Travers, then general manager, was placed under police surveillance. As a result of what Travers told the day following his sentence the information was laid against Dr. Beattie Nesbitt, charging him with making false returns to the government of the bank's financial position.


