The annual archaeological report for 1911 received by The Warder contains the following addition to the government museum, donated by Mr. F. D. HE REFUSES TO QUIT

HON. A. E. MORINE HAS ACCOMPLISHED MANY THINGS.

Head of Commission That is to Inquire Into the Conditions of the Civil Service and Advise Steps For Its Improvement is a Man Who Has Made a Reputation in Various Callings.

Hon. A. E. Morine, K.C., Toronto; G. N. Ducharme, Montreal, and R. S. Lake, K.C., ex-M.P. Quappelle, are a commission just formed to investigate the efficiency of the Dominion civil service. These three men have been empowered to enquire into the whole matter of federal administration in Canada. Mr. Morine will sit at the head of the table when the commission commences its enquiry. The chairman has a rather remarkable inquisitive and cosmopolitan type of mind. Most men find that a life time is only too short to do themselves justice in one profession. Mr. Morine has been prominent as a journalist and leader of the Bar. He has thundered editorially and pleaded as counsel in two countries—Canada and Newfoundland. Mr. Morine lives in Toronto now. Wreck Beyond the Reach of Divers

London, April 17.—A hydrographic authority gives the following information: The Titanic lies, roughly, 12,000 feet deep, or considerably over two miles below the surface of the water. At that depth the pressure of the water is about two and one-half tons to the square inch. At 12,000 feet deep, a man would bear upon his body a weight equal to that of twenty locomotive engines, each with a long goods train loaded with pig iron.

Under this enormous pressure the luxurious fittings of the gigantic liner are probably crushed like so much tissue paper; the water-tight doors of the unflooded part of the vessel are smashed in like so much matchwood, and the woodwork of the furniture is possibly compressed out of shape.

In the absolute stillness of the depths of the ocean, where there is perpetual night, the Titanic must remain. Any attempt at salvage is utterly out of the question.

At a depth of about 200 feet, divers suffer great hardships. At the depth at which the Titanic is resting, diving is absolutely impossible.

Countys Share of High School Maintenance

Reeve Jas. Graham, of Carden, Warden Steele, of Eldon, and Reeve Michael, of Mariposa, were in town on Friday, April 19, convening as a High School settlement committee.

The cost of maintenance of the High School to the County for the past year has been larger than other years; this must be accounted for, from the fact that more pupils are attending high school than previously.

The cost of maintaining this institution has been greater also. The extra amount paid this year is only a mere bagatelle and in reality cannot be considered an extra expense from above facts. The amount paid by the county last year to the institute was \$3,500, while this year it is \$3,800, an increase of \$300.

Raphael is equally pessimistic, and tells us that in January there is to be much unrest, that foreign affairs will be unsettled, that the theatre and music-halls will be under a cloud.

The voice of the stars, speaking through Zadkiel, predicts considerable unrest for the month of February, especially on the Continent, and the British Government is to pass through a critical time towards the end of the month.

During the year there are to be four eclipses, the most important for England being on April 17th, when there will be a total blotting-out of the sun. "This takes place in Aries, the ruling sign for England. It will cause grief and sadness to mortals, and the Government will have a serious crisis to face.

PROPHETS ARE BUSY.

They Foresee a Host of Things For Us In 1912.

The Famous River Ganges. The river Ganges, in India, is famous for two things—its alleged purifying influence on all who bathe in it and its mudliness. For ages there has been a belief among the Hindus that a dip in the Ganges, particularly at Benares, where the water is full of impurities, is a safeguard against the cholera, typhoid fever and other infectious diseases. An analytical examination of the river water at Benares has revealed the interesting fact that the Ganges is fairly alive with bacteria antagonistic to the bacilli of cholera and typhoid. The plague ridden Hindu who plunges into the river to bathe in it and even to swallow a few mouthfuls of the muddy water provides himself with a vast army of useful microbes which will quickly sweep out of existence and out of his system the deadly microbes of disease.
