The value of the shipment would total \$5,000. In conversation with Mr. Graham he informed the Warder man that producers made money on hogs at present prices, and said he sold hogs to a local butcher when in the raising industry at \$5.25 per hur dred and made a snug profit. Shipper McIlhargey delivered 168 hogs to the Matthews Co., of Peterboro, on Thursday which would average 200 lbs. each. For these the buyer paid \$8.15, the total amount paid being in the vicinity of \$3,000.




