She stated that she had been traveling about the country in search of her husband, and that his ill-treatment of her caused her to commit the act.

**Memorial For a Poet.**

His poems are such as should be in every Canadian home and should be prized by all who love their native land and admire all that is wholesome and good in literature.**
