Drainage and Good Roads

Mr.A. W. Campbell during a speech at the Chicago convention said : I think the whole question of roadmaking is practically boiled down to three great principles. The first is drainage, the second is drainage, and the third is drainage. (Applause.) The first would be to drain the foundation. Just as necessary to provide a dry foundation for a road as it is for a building. The The second would be to crown the road so perfectly as to shed the water while it is running from the centre into the side gutter. And the third would be to cover that road, or the portion of it that is travelled, with material that is impermeable to water, that will resist the traffic and prevent the soakage of water into the roadway. We sometimes create the false impression that the stone or gravel or other material that is placed on the road is put there for the purpose of making the hard road but it is simply placed there for the purpose of carrying off the water and resisting the wear-it is the earth foundation after all that must carry the load, and if the earth foundation is not thoroughly drained then, sir, it is useless for you to horse stable, strawhouse, all at-
