PRESS AND COUNCIL

Little fault can be found with Ald. Cinnamon for stating his views on the press, at Monday night's council meeting; and all the less because, as he always does, the alderman expressed those views with moderation and courtesy. It is unlikely, however, that the views themselves are as defensible as the manner of their expression. The alderman's proposal to exclude the reporters from committee meetings was hardly supported by the objections to their conduct that he cited in its behalf; partly because most of them did not refer to reports of committee meetings, and partly because the rest of them did not occur at all. For example, neither paper said there was nothing done the night the council sat till twelve o'clock. The other reports objected to recorded actual occurrences. In fact Ald. Cinnamon's objections were not that inaccurate reports were made but that things that actually occurred were reported and should not have been. He did say things were reported that never happened, but unfortunately gave no instance in support of this serious charge, even when challenged by the Post representative to do so. Ald. Cinnamon's position then, is that the press must report not the proceedings but merely such parts of the proceedings as the aldermen will like to see in print. That, of course, is putting a construction on the function of the press that had not occurred to the reporters; and one with which it is likely that neither they nor the public will concur. It would be a pleasant duty to suppress all the proceedings of meetings except such as flatter those who take part in them; but it would not be journalism. The function of a newspaper is to give the news. There are things that occur which ought not to be published, as for instance, when things happen to people by no fault of theirs, the publication of which would cause them suffering and answer no good purpose; but the conduct of aldermen at the council board in the presence of men whom they know are there to report the proceedings, does not belong to this class. Aldermen must seek some other means of preserving their reputations, then by having their deeds at the council board kept out of the newspapers. The aldermen have a right to demand an accurate report of their doings; and the press has a right to demand the privilege of making that report. If both aldermen and reporters are honest they have common ground. And we think that occupying that ground they will be endorsed by the public. They want the news; it is in the interest of the town that they should get it. They must be given no reason to doubt the newspapers they read give it with substantial accuracy; and so far as we are concerned they never shall; we shall either report the proceedings of council or be excluded from the meetings as Ald. Cinnamon threatens; and we fancy that contingency presents difficulties that the alderman has not well considered.

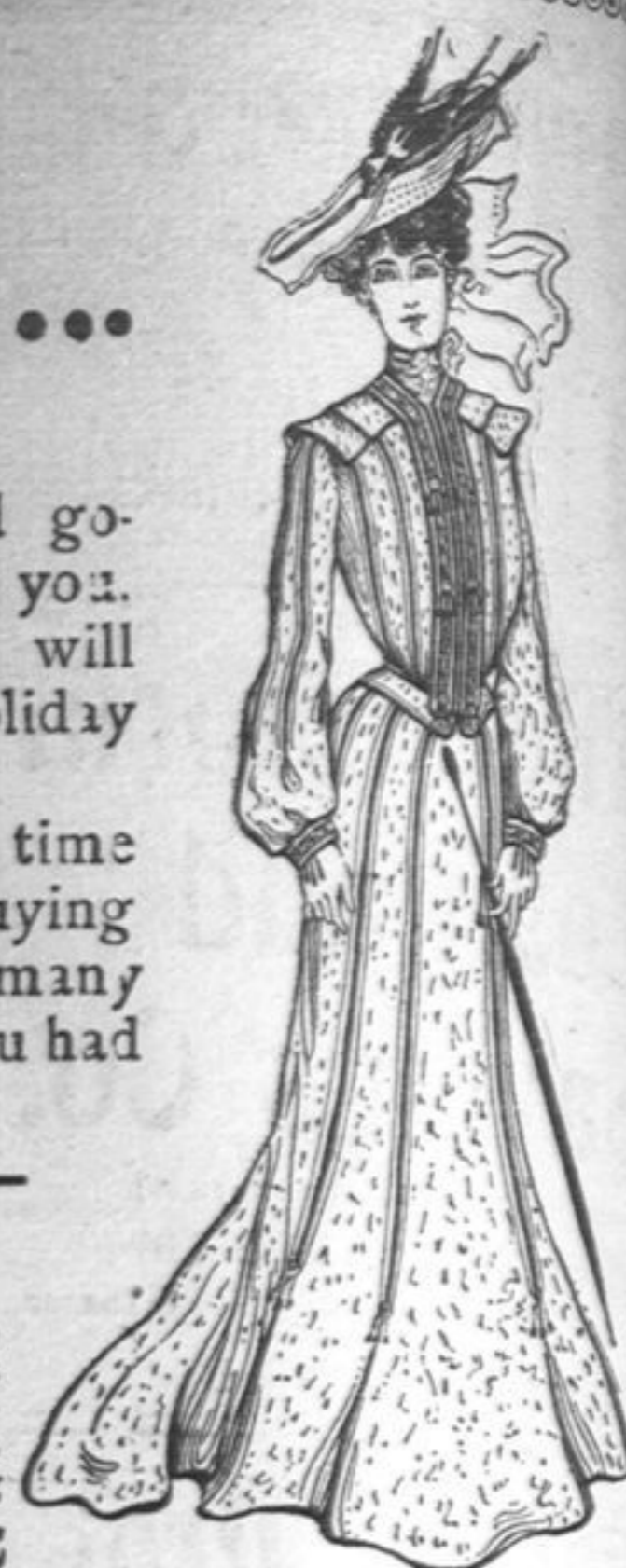
