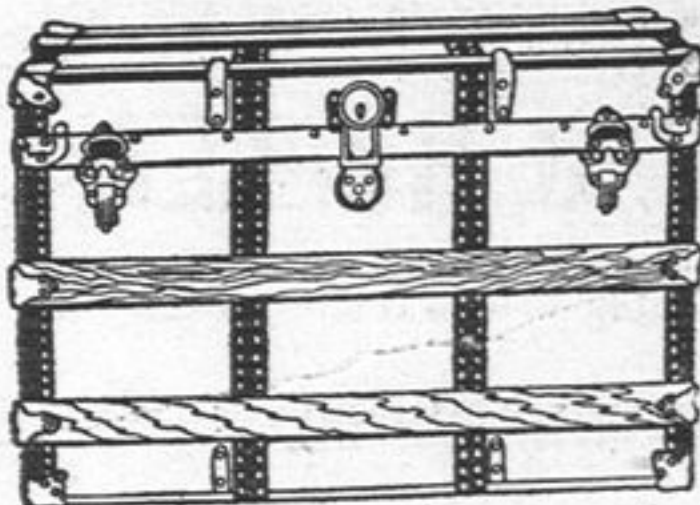

THE MARKETS.

Wheat and Corn Unchanged at Liverpool and Lower at Chicago—Cattle Markets—The Latest Quotations.

Monday Evening, May 11. Liverpool wheat and corn futures closed unchanged to-day from Saturday. At Chicago, July wheat closed 1/4c lower, than Saturday; July corn 1/4c lower, and July oats 1/4c lower.

THE VISIBLE SUPPLY. As compared with a week ago, the visible supply of wheat in Canada and the United States has decreased 1,010,000 bushels; corn decreased 240,000 bushels; oats increased 76,000 bushels. Following is a comparative statement for the week ending to-day, the preceding week and the corresponding week of last year:

CATTLE MARKETS.

Cables Firmer—Trading Short, With Better Prices at Montreal.

London, May 11.—Live cattle firmer, at 11 1/2c to 12 1/2c per lb. for American steers, 11c to 12 1/2c per lb.; refrigerator beef, 9c to 9 1/2c per lb. Sheep, 14c to 15c, dressed weight.

MONTREAL LIVE STOCK. Montreal, May 11.—Cattle—Receipts about 400 head of butchers' cattle, 500 calves and 150 sheep and lambs offered for sale at the East End Abattoir to-day. The butchers were out strong, but trading was slow, as the prices of good cattle were fully 1/4c per pound higher than on last week's market, and common stock was also dearer than usual. Prime beefs sold at from 5c to 5 1/2c per pound, and they were not of extra quality. Medium cattle sold at from 3 1/2c to 4 1/2c, and the common stock from 2 1/2c to 3 1/2c per pound. Calves sold from \$1 to \$10 each, or from 2 1/2c to 3c per pound. Sheep sold at from 2 1/2c to 4 1/2c each, and an extra lamb brought \$4. Fat hogs sold at from \$5.40 to \$6.05 per hundred pounds, weighed off cars.

Eggs—Receipts, 18,000 head; active; pigs, 5c to 10c higher, others 5c to 10c lower; heavy, \$6.90 to \$6.95, a few \$7; mixed, \$6.90; roasters, \$6.35 to \$6.90; pigs, \$5.90 to \$7; roughs, \$5.75 to \$6; stags, \$5 to \$5.25. Sheep and lambs—Receipts, 19,700 head; active; 20c to 25c higher; top lambs, \$7.60 to \$7.70; culls to good, \$4.50 to \$7.50; yearlings, \$6.75 to \$8.50; ewes, \$5 to \$5.25; sheep, top, mixed, \$5.25 to \$5.50; culls to food, \$2 to \$5.15.
