RESERVOIRS IN TRENT WATERS STORY OF THEIR TRANSFER

Under Control of Department of Railways and Canals for the purpose of maintaining water in the Canal

On February 6, 1904, the department of railways and canals at Ottawa through L. K. Jones, its sec. retary, proposed to the Ontario commissioner of public works, Hon. F. R. Latchford, the assumption of the several dams of the head waters of the Trent canal which were then controlled by his department in the interests of the lumber trade, which, the proposition says, "is now rapidly diminishing."

"It is desired," says the letter, "to utilize these dams in connection with a scheme for an extensive reservoir system to insure sufficient water supply at all measons for navigation purposes in the canal, by storing and controlling the freshet waters; such system being an essential to the cana. efficiency to secure wnich so considerable an expenditure has been made by the dominion.

"The matter has recently been brought before your department at an interview with the assistant commissioner by certain officers of this department, you yourself being absent, and at his suggestion this formal application is made to you.
