NEW HORSES FOR FIRE HALL

BELL REPLACED ON MARKET

The Board of Works contemplates Improvements in Streets, and Sidewalks—The City's Health and General Appearance will receive attention

The board of works and other committees of the town council met in the clerk's office on Monday night. Considerable time was spent in the discussion of street repairs and improvements. Some of the new recommendations are as follows: Making a gully hole at northwest corner of Melbourne and William-sts commencing at the following: Melbourne street west of William street should be graded and rolled. St. Paul street should be graded and rolled from corner of Queen to John streets. Wellington street should be rolled when graded. Fair avenue should be graded and rolled. Mill street should be rolled and graded from Russell to Durham-sts. A man should be employed to take up the rubbish from the main streets and to take care of the gravel pit. The members of council should go and see the places where improvements are proposed. Mayor Vrooman suggested the building of a granolithic walk from Cambridge to Adelaide streets on the north side of Kent street, and that the section in the vicinity of the market hall be done as soon as possible. On motion of Alderman O'Reilly, the commissioner was requested to bring in a report on a 6-foot sidewalk from Cambridge to Sussex-streets, and 5 feet from Sussex to Adelaide streets. The chairman of the board of works will bring in a report at the meeting of council on Monday night stating all granolithic walks which should be built this year. A motion was passed instructing the clerk to advertise for tenders for sewer tile. Mayor Vrooman advised the purchase of another pair of horses for the fire department, so as to give better service in case of fire, and to provide for the necessary work about town. A resolution regarding this will be introduced at Monday evening's session. Messrs. Berg, Rea and Fisher will be a committee to purchase the horses. Mr. Bell asked for something to be done about more places for goose-necks for filling the watering cart, as at present much time is lost in taking the water at one place. He also asked that something be done to cause the sound of the fire bell to be heard at greater distance as since the dials were put in the fire house tower the bell cannot be heard at times at distant points and it is not fair to fine the firemen for not turning out when it was not possible for them to hear the alarm. It was decided to bring the old bell back for a fire alarm, and this will do away with the difficulty arising from the alarms sometimes conflicting with the striking of the hour.

MUSIC AND THE DRAMA

"The Holy City," a play written around the life of Christ, was presented at the Academy of Music on Tuesday evening last. The audience was unfortunately small, we say unfortunately because we say the play was one of the best seen here this or any other season. Whilst the play was of a deeply religious sentiment, it does not appeal to one as a sermon, but it is a dramatic effort so human, that it shows the inner motives of men's lives as though we looked into their very hearts. The cast of the company has been carefully selected and was a splendidly balanced one, whilst the scenery,

effects, etc. left nothing to be desired. It is to be hoped that a return visit can be secured by this admirable company, when we feel assured they will be greeted with a bumper house.

The engagement of Miss Roselle Knott, the Canadian actress, at the Academy of Music on Monday, May 14th, is being looked forward to by our local theatre-goers with very much interest. Miss Knott gives life and feeling to her portrayal of Mary Tudor. There is nothing of the mechanical about her work—she feels what she is doing and convinces you of it by her words, her expression, and very often by her silence as it is, this very naturalness, this very heart and feeling, fairly wins an audience without the audience knowing that it is being won. This role is a varying one, a character of conflicting sentiments and emotions, and very often by her riveting girl, then the girl whose nature is awakened into being and joy by the true, gentle caress of love's finger tips.

She becomes the woman of soberer thoughts and more serious mien. She has moments that call for dramatic force and surprised intensity. It is a series of splendid pictures that Miss Knott draws. She is essentially a comedienne and her comical points are scored with delightful, convincing effect. But she does not let the part suffer in its versatility and varying demands. She shades and colors it to suit the moment's theme, or the situation. She is a woman of personal charm and magnetism. She works with heart as well as mentality and she achieves her effects.

There are few but who are familiar with "When Knighthood was in Flower," either in book or play form. The incidents of the play are in the sixteenth century in England, a period prolific of costume and gallantry, of coquetry and sword play. It is in the reign of King Henry VIII of England, and he is bent on wedding his sister Mary to the King of France. She rebels, and in male attire elopes with Charles Brandon, captain of the King's guards. They are captured and he is to be executed, but, to save his life, she consents to marry the King of France. At the time of the latter some months later she is rescued from the Daulphin by Charles Brandon. They are married and return to England, there to receive the forgiveness and blessing of her brother the King, who, upon Mary Tudor's request, makes Charles Brandon the Duke of Suffolk.
