WITH THE SALVATION ARMY EMIGRANTS TO CANADA

(By J. J. HART.)

In order to discover the prospects of settlers in Canada, the London Illustrated Mail sent a representative with the first batch of Salvation Army emigrants, with instructions to send letters, describing the arrival of the immigrants, and how they were being settled on the land.

Mr. Jas. J. Hart, who was selected for the work, was in Lindsay on the Sunday that the Commissioner of the Salvation Army spoke at the Academy of Music. He was very much impressed with the Army's method of handling the immigrants, and also with this country. Below we publish Mr. Hart's account of the journey across the ocean and the arrival in Canada.

HOW IT IS WORKED. In a nutshell, here is the system. Those parts of the Dominion which are now being settled are planned into districts. In each an army officer is appointed to act as agent.
