or without hard labor. ANOTHER FAR-REACHING

CLAUSE. Sections 9 and 113 of Dominion elections act 1900 are hereby repealed, and the following is substituted for section 1113:

The hiring or paying for, or promising to pay for, any horse, team, carriage, cab, or other vehicle, or for any boat, steamboat, or other vessel by any candidate or his agent, or other person on his behalf, to convey any voter or voters to or from the polls, or to or from the neighborhood thereof at any election or the payment by any candidate or his agent, or other person on his behalf, of travelling or other expenses of any voter in going to or returning from any election are unlawful acts.
