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ACCEPTED JAPANESE AID. The contribution of the Japanese Red Cross association of \$50,000,000 to the San Francisco sufferers, has been accepted by Secretary Taft in his capacity as President of the American Red Cross association.

BOTH LEGS SEVERED. Willie Taylor, the 16-year old son of Philip Taylor, and an employe of the Canadian Cordage Company at Peterboro, had both legs severed below the knees on Wednesday, May 9. He was returning to work, and was walking along the track near his house, when he was struck by a C.P.R. freight train. He is expected to recover.

GREAT NORTHERN PROGRESS. President J. J. Hill, of the Great Northern railway, with a party of leading officials, was in Winnipeg last week, and in an interview says that his company's line from Winnipeg to the Pacific will be built by the time the C.P.R. and G.T.P. roads now projected are built, and ready to compete for the freight traffic of the new sections of the west.

STRIKE OF EMPRESS STOKERS. The stokers and coal trimmers to the number of seven-and-a-half, forming part of the Empress of Britain's crew, struck work this afternoon and walked ashore. The strikers stated that they had rebelled against the treatment accorded them by the captain, and used language towards them not accustomed to, and furthermore, he refused them their accustomed half-day shore leave, which caused them to strike. Captain Walsh, marine superintendent of the C.P.R., went among the men, and after reasoning with them induced after to return to the ship at five o'clock. It is estimated that fully ten thousand people, hundreds coming from different parts of Canada and the United States, have visited the Empress since her arrival.

PRINCE ARTHUR HOME. Prince Arthur arrived in London on Friday evening, May 18. At the station he was received by Col. Sir Alfred Egerton, Comptroller of the Duke of Connaught's household; Sir Edward Seymour, General Sir Thomas Kelly-Kenny, the Japanese Charge d'Affaires, and Major Green Williams, private secretary to the Duke of Connaught. The party drove away in carriages sent by the King to Buckingham Palace. On landing from the Virginia he was welcomed by the Lord Mayor of Liverpool. Referring to his extended Liverpool, the Prince said it had been a most delightful in every way. The trip across the Atlantic had been pleasant throughout, except for the wait necessitated outside of Liverpool by the prevalence of a heavy fog for several hours.

GAMEY'S MONEY FOR CHARITY. All Toronto, Ont., May 17.—The money paid into the High Court by R. E.
