CHURCH UNION

AN INTERESTING LETTER FROM REV. MR. WILSON, DUNSFORD

To the Editor of The Watchman-Warder.

Dear Sir,—In the issues of April 25th and May 2nd, of the Canadian Churchman appear two letters on "Corporate Reunion" written by Canon Jarvis, of Napanee. These letters are very timely inasmuch as the question of Church Union is now before the public, not only in this country, but in England, and in fact, one might say, throughout the world. At any rate, in India, Japan, Australia, and the United States, the question is well to the front. The letters are timely, also, because Canon Jarvis treats the subject from an Anglican point of view. I think no one will misunderstand the Canon when he says, "For the sake of definiteness let us consider solely the question of reunion with the Methodists." Certainly no one knows better than Canon Jarvis that if union with Methodists is possible little difficulty would be found with other large bodies of Protestants in, at least, this country, in coming into unity. It would appear from the Canon's observation that episcopacy, therefore, the question of church government, would be about the only thing in the way of reunion. Judging this to be his conclusion in the light of the Lambette Quadrilateral, which he quotes, and which embraces all the Anglicans would think worth while contending for, I do not see that there is much beyond the matter of church government, for a Methodist to contend for. The Lambette proposal lays down as a working basis of union the following platform:

- (1) The sufficiency and supremacy of the Holy Scripture.
- (2) The Apostles Creed as the Baptismal symbol, and the adequate statement of the Christian faith.
- (3) The two sacraments ordained by our Lord, Baptism and Holy Communion, ministered with unfailing use of His words of institution and of the elements ordained by Him.
- (4) The historic episcopate, locally adapted in its methods of administration to the varying needs of the nations and peoples, called of God in the unity of His church.

Certainly, in reviewing this platform of reunion, there seems to be little in the way of Methodists, and others perhaps, coming into harmony upon such a basis. In reference to episcopacy, the question with Methodists, I do not think, would hinge upon whether it is of the "esse" or "bene esse" of the church. The Anglicans themselves, if I understand their position, are not quite agreed in relation to the matter of episcopacy being the "esse" or "bene esse" of the church. The question with Methodists would be whether, synthetically speaking, the episcopal administration would be most expedient for the government of the United Church. The present Methodist policy seems to be somewhat of a compromise between episcopacy and presbytery. Perhaps, more episcopal than any other if technically described. Although it may as well be confessed, her policy appears, to some at least, to be a little at sea. From the nature of her mission at first polity did not appear to be of so great importance. But, in view of her development, and the more responsible obligations assumed by her, polity becomes very important. If the episcopacy should be "locally adapted to varying needs," we would have a polity within the scope of the conception Methodists generally have of church government, and, therefore, there ought to be no insurmountable barrier in the way of reunion. Most certainly that form of church polity the history of which parallels the history of her dogma embodied in the creeds, the ecumenical creeds. I mean, would likely possess essential elements, not to be found in other forms of later development. That the episcopal polity was the form of government in the church for fourteen or more centuries must, I think, be admitted as a matter of fact. That it also was the form of the polity developed during the first two centuries when the church was in the purgatory of its spiritual life is also readily obvious. True it was more or less corrupted, but it does not at all follow that the Apostolic form cannot be restored, or that it could not have been perpetuated. To guard the indefectibility, the continuity, of the church, is a most important thing, and to note the struggle of the Church of England, a struggle, perhaps, not paralleled in any other land, to maintain this continuity against other forces, is to note the struggles of heroes.

The "crux" of the matter I think (I am only speaking for myself) is set forth in Canon Jarvis' second letter. The position of the Anglican Church is very clearly indicated, in the Latin sentence the Canon sees fit to use, "Quod accipit teneo, nec demuto quod del est." Episcopacy is a divine trust which cannot be given up, therefore, of the very being of the church. This sounds very much like the ground taken by Cyprian many centuries ago. This much is certain, however, according to Canon Jarvis, the Anglicans will not, cannot, yield episcopacy. But, according to the Lambette Quadrilateral, which he believes in, it may be adapted to local needs. There is hope in this position. The manner in

which the Canon paves the way of approach is so ingenious that it becomes interesting. The matters of "succession," of the "validity of orders," will be kept in abeyance in the discussion. The value of these things will be disclosed in the light of calm judgment, and broader vision, as time passes on, but for the present let them alone. Something else is more important just now. In view of the fact that the Church Union Committee representing the Congregational, Presbyterian and Methodist bodies, has found in their wisdom church union desirable and practicable, and, also, that the superior courts of these bodies have concurred in an invitation to Anglicans to enter upon negotiations with union in view. Communications of the character of Canon Jarvis' letters will be very welcome to the church-loving public. The movement, I think, should have the impetus of sympathetic discussion. That public sympathy is strongly behind the whole movement, is very well known. But that the church courts have been put to work, is not a sufficient reason for a public to abide quiescent. If the conclusions which will be submitted, are to be unquestioned and abiding, let the public pass its opinion while matters are passing. It may be of some interest to know that the committee has made ample provision for the information of the public. A line to the secretaries (Rev. Dr. Sutherland is one of them) addressed to Toronto, will secure, without cost, the minutes and proceedings of all the Union Committees' work, so that the fullest information is within the reach of every one.
