Ops Council Proceedings

A regular meeting of Ops Council was held on May 27th, with all members present.
 The minutes of last meeting were read, and were confirmed on motion of Messrs. O'Loughlin and Wilson, after the resolution relating to statute labor commutation had been rescinded.

COMMUNICATIONS.

A letter from the Secretary of the Board of Railway Commissioners in reference to the crossing on 2nd con. road at lot 22.
 A letter from Mr. R. J. McLaughlin, referring to the drainage near Harnett's Corner, now in the hands of the township engineer.
 An account from Mr. John Carew for lumber supplied for swing bridge approaches.
 Mr. Geo. Bryans, of the east ward, Lindsay, called the attention of Council to a broken-down culvert at the boundary road east of his place, which caused the water to overflow his land. He thought about 300 x 8 inch tile should be put in to carry the water off. He had spoken to Mr. Rea, town commissioner, about it, and he was of opinion that 6 inch tile would be large enough and would endeavor to procure them. The Council assured Mr. Bryans that if 8 inch tile were needed they would pay the difference in cost of tile provided that those directly interested would do the work, and Mr. Wilson said he would see the Ops ratepayers concerned.
 Mr. Thos. Downey, of Reaboro, said some of the sidewalks there are much in need of repair. It was decided that the Commissioner and the pathmasters would attend to them.
 Mr. John Whalen said the 7th concession road between the 3rd and 4th quarter lines was badly cut up owing to the traffic on it, while the swing bridge was closed. He said they had no gravel to repair it. The Council informed him that they could now get gravel at Mr. Walden's, lately purchased.
 Mr. Joseph Tavis, owner of E. J. 16, con. 6, addressed the Council on the necessity of draining from his locality into Mr. Guiry's creek. Messrs. John J. Pogue, Wm. McCabe, Jos. Robertson, Thos. Simons and Wm. J. Megahay are interested, and he thought that if each paid a fair share of the cost, the work could be easily done, and the services of an engineer dispensed with. They had estimated the cost at from \$300 to \$325, of which he was willing to pay \$125. Mr. Pogue said he would pay \$100, provided the Council would give him two outlets across the 3rd quarter line. Mr. Davies said the others had not yet stated how much they would pay. The drain would benefit both the concession road and the side road and he had come to find what assistance the Council would give.
 The Council approved of the proposal and agreed to assist to about one-sixth of the cost.
 Mr. Geo. Hall complained of the fence on the boundary between Ops and Emily at Lot 12, being thrown down repeatedly, letting stock on his place. As he lives in Emily the Council advised him to see the Emily Council, and the Clerk was instructed to write to the alleged offender.
 The Clerk was also instructed to ask Mr. Thos. Robinson, pathmaster on Manvers boundary, to see that no Manvers people take gravel from the Bennett pit.
 The Reeve and Mr. Coulter reported having bought a gravel pit from Mr. Thos. H. Walden for \$200, and on motion of Messrs. Coulter and Wilson a cheque was issued for Mr. Walden.

ROAD APPROPRIATIONS.

After duly considering the state of the township roads, the appropriations already made for road material and wire fences, the Council, on motion of Messrs. Best and Coulter appropriated \$1800 for roads, to be divided amongst the road divisions as follows: No. 1, \$348; No. 2, \$242; No. 3, \$405; No. 4, \$351; and No. 5, \$360.
 A by-law to borrow money to pay the current expenses of the Township was now introduced, received the usual readings, and was passed, signed and sealed.
 The Clerk was instructed to write to the Board of Railway Commissioners about the crossing mentioned on 2nd Con. road at lot 22; to Mr. McDonnell, roadmaster of the C. P. R., about Pottery Corner Crossing, and to Mr. McLaughlin, about the drainage matter near Harnett's Corner.
 On motion of Messrs. Coulter and Wilson the W. J. lot 14, con. 8, was attached to Beat 37, W. J. lot 19, con. 8, and such other lots as formerly belonged to Beat No. 78, were restored to it.
 The account from Mr. Carew, and one from Lindsay Council, were passed and paid.
 The Council then adjourned till June 24th on motion of Messrs. Coulter and Wilson.
