**ELDON COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS.**  
Lorneville, April 24.—A special  
meeting of the council of Eldon was  
held in Plank's Hall, Lorneville, on  
Saturday, April 24, for the purpose  
of reading the by-law providing for  
the borrowing of money to repair,  
extend and make a new outlet for  
municipal drain No. 1 of the town-  
ship of Eldon and Thorah and for  
issuing debentures re same.  
The minutes of the former meeting  
of April 17 were read, and on mo-  
tion of Councillor McDonald, second-  
ed by Councillor Robinson, the mi-  
nutes were adopted.  
Spence—Robinson: That by-law  
No. 335 of the municipality of the  
township of Eldon; a by-law to pro-  
vide for the repairing and extension  
of municipal drain No. 1, in the  
township of Eldon in the county of  
Victoria, and for making a new out-  
let thereto and for borrowing on the  
credit of the municipality the sum  
of \$9,610, the proportion to be con-  
tributed by the said municipality for  
completing the same, be now intro-  
duced and read a first time.—Car-  
ried.  
By-law No. 335 was here introduc-  
ed and read.  
McDonald—McEachern: That by-  
law No. 335 of the township of El-  
don, a by-law relating to municip-  
al drain No. 1 be now read a sec-  
ond time.—Carried.

ceedings to quash; and when they  
are printed to serve a copy of same  
upon each of the owners of lands as-  
sessed for drain as per sect. 22 of  
the municipal drainage act.—Carried.
